Remarks on board Thursday January the 2nd 1862

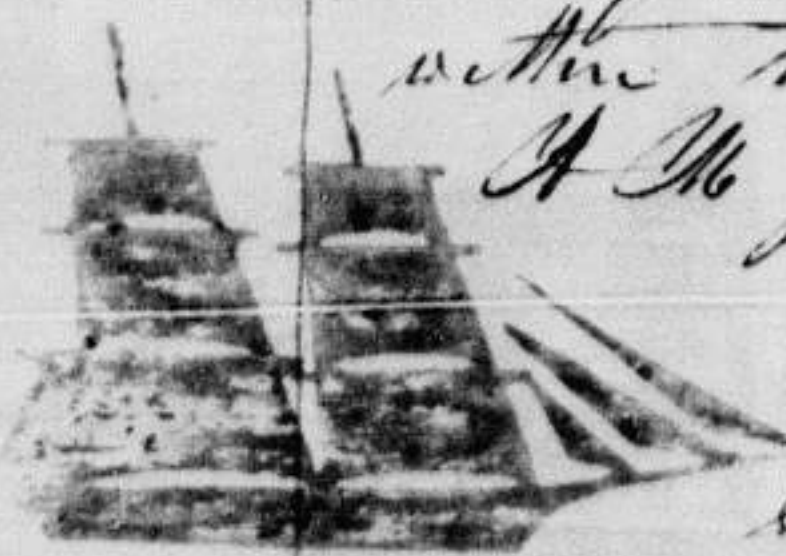
Commenced with fine breezes from north east and good weather at one o'clock the husband boat took a whale along side got the cutting gear cleft & at three o'clock the Starboard boat took a shark along side got red and cut in the small whale at seven o'clock P.M. set the watch big heading north north west and signally with them the night & day light Commenced eating in the other state later part fresh breeze So ends eating and boiling Latitude 25th 06' Long 35th 23'

Remarks on board Friday January the 3rd 1862

Commenced with fresh breezes from north east and fine weather at one o'clock P.M. got the whale cut in saw two sails heading to the eastward at six o'clock P.M. saw ship to the eastward and bears them strong the night to the windward later part strong breeze So ends boiling Lat 25th 33' Long 35th 40'

Remarks on board Saturday January the 4th 1862

Commenced with strong breezes from northeast and raged rather all shores empty taking care of the oil had strong breeze and squally weather thru the night at eight o'clock P.M. got three boiling had it rany later part strong breeze and a my within nothing in sight So ends Lat

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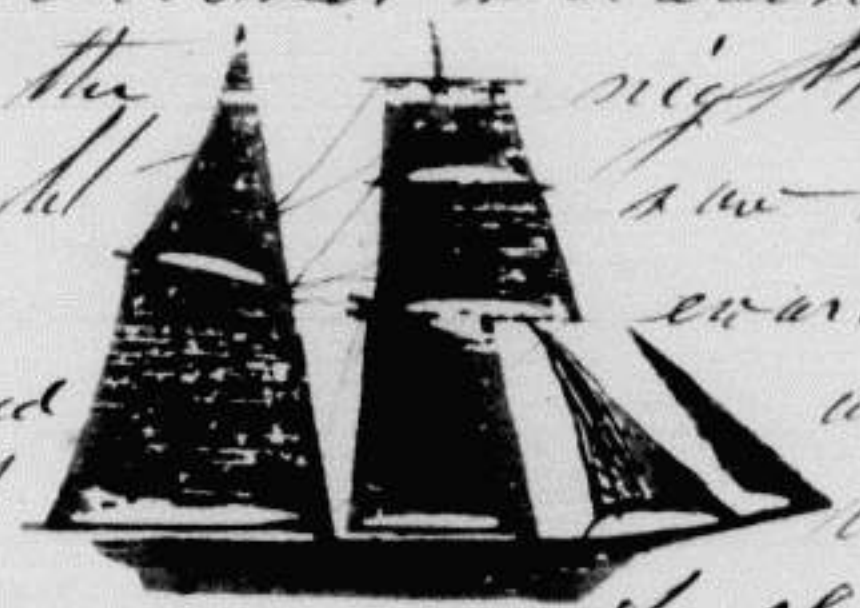
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Remarks on board Sunday January the 5th 1862

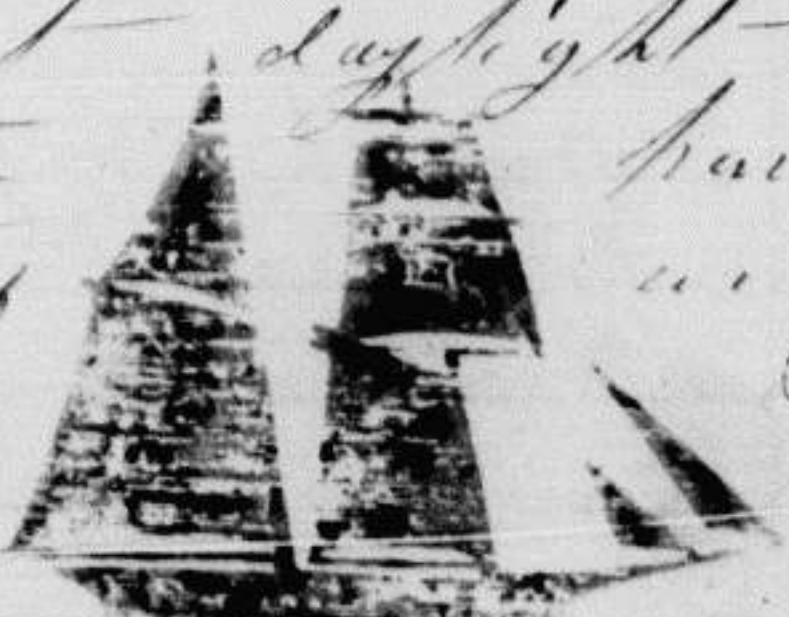
Commenced with strong breezes from the north east and raged and ran rather at one o'clock P.M. sighted up wind a schooner then each of oil at four o'clock P.M. saw ship to the westward at sundown set boats crew eating had it rany most of the night at daylight set the foresail later part strong breeze heading north west by the wind nothing in sight So ends no latitude

Remarks on board Monday January the 6th 1862

Commenced with strong breezes from north north east and thick and raged rather saw a top sail schooner steering to the eastward latter part of the night made no tea gail at daylight saw to sail going two one to the eastward and the other to the westward at eleven o'clock P.M. saw ship to the eastward later part strong breeze So ends Lat 36th 51' Long 35th 34'

Remarks on board Tuesday January the 7th 1862

Commenced with a gail from north east and a bad sea gail at sundown had down the hatches & expected the catch of oil being too heading east later strong breeze the night at daylight commenced raining later part strong breeze and So ends east
