Clear sunny weather warm in the afternoon carried Mrs. Jones from the corner around town at 6 o'clock Mr. Hans took the horse and went to ride in the evening I was at home bought a hat &c. from 10 o'clock

Sunday 28th

Clear pleasant morning, comfortable day went to church heard Mr. Hester in the afternoon at home did not go out any where read Puffin's "Platonic Philosophy" very excellent book I think

Monday 29th

The mail 18 East. sent to R.R. in the evening

Tuesday 30th

A East mail nothing new letters from E. Knapp in the evening

Wednesday July 1st

And 18 East same evening called at Butler & Hans in the evening

Thursday 2nd

And 18 East at Mr. Hester's with evening letters at 4 o'clock

Friday 3rd

And 18 East came from the country and succeeded in the evening

Saturday 4th

This the the glorious Fourth a beautiful day for the celebration nothing could be finer. The Ballon ascension was one of the finest descriptions the procession was very well got up. It was rather foggy in the evening met Mrs. Riddle & her family in the morning

Sunday 5th

A clear fine day went to Mrs. Cummins in the evening from 10 o'clock

Monday 6th

Foggy mist 11 in the morning to R.R. from 11 o'clock

Tuesday 7th

Clear sun & 11 in the evening at home

Wednesday 8th

Clear sun 11 in the evening at E. Knapp's from 11 o'clock

Thursday 9th

Clear sun 11 in the evening sent to Mrs. Whiting

Friday 10th

And 11 sent to ride went to Mrs. Cooke and home at 11 o'clock after that time sent to home

Saturday 11th

Clear sun 11 in the morning Mr. Pacey made an ascent in his Balloon a splendid one and landed in the evening about 10 miles from the starting point

Sunday 12th

A clear warm day went to church this morning Mr. Hester preached nothing very great but fair in the afternoon at home read History of United States went at 4 p.m. to R.R. the steam also clear all but static time from 10 o'clock to 12 o'clock

July Monday 13th 1837 July

Nothing new transferred to day in the evening at home

Tuesday 14th 1837 July

At home in the evening carried Mr. Butler out to Dartmouth returned 1/2 past 9 o'clock

Wednesday 15th

Went into Mrs. Charles Conell's next home with the Kendall girls

Thursday 16th

At home Room in the evening

Friday 17th

Went out to Dartmouth and carried Maria came back and sent to R.R. at home at 12 o'clock

Saturday 18th

Nothing new taken place Mr. Hans went to the Vineyard took the horse in the evening at Butler

Sunday 19th

A comfortable day went to church heard Mr. Hester not terribly delighted in the afternoon went to Mr. Butler took tea went to Mrs. R.R. in the evening did not till 11 o'clock

Monday 20th

And J.W. foggy went to Mr. Beckett County Room to night Mr. Hans still at the Vineyard

Tuesday 21st

Mr. H. returned from the Vineyard and things continued did not sell that horse in the evening I went to Butler County Room took a glass of J.C. at Menage

Wednesday 22nd

Nothing over the same routine of daily life I went to Mrs. Cook in the evening for I Elizabeth returned and sent to Hans Room home at 10 1/2 o'clock

Thursday 23rd

Cloudy & rainy this morning a heavy rain during the night in the evening went to Mrs. R.R. the and Mr. & Mrs. Ben. Routh came down to the concert in city square sent home at 9 1/2 o'clock had till 10 o'clock

Friday 24th

Cloudy & rainy not much sun to day in the evening sent to Hans home at 11 o'clock

Saturday 25th

The Ship "KENSINGTON" Arrived this morning Capt. Clark came on shore about 7 1/2 o'clock the ship anchored at the light house a short time every thing looks first rate and I think the voyage has been very fully conducted I think "Hill" Capt. Clark a first rate man to conduct a voyage

Sunday 26th

Spent the forenoon with Capt. Clark at the B. Room home at 12 o'clock talked over all matters concerning the voyage went to Mrs. R.R. in the evening I received a "gift" from her pleasant and painful. pleasant to have her return to that extent painful because it opens an account all the deeper feeling of my own heart to which I have never before
