

Wednesday Oct 7th 1837
this day begins with light breezes from
North steering E by S with all sail set
middle part calm latter thick and
rains wind from S.E to S steering to the
E.S.E so ends this day Lat 38.30
Long 30.21

Thursday Oct 8th first part middle
part light winds from W steering
E by S. 1st under all sail latter part
fine weather wind S.W at 6 A.M. made
Dip bearing S.E by Compass Dip 40 miles
in each steering along the land and several
sail Lat 38.33 North Long 28.16 W

Friday Oct 9th all these 24 hours strong
breezes from S.W to S.E with the land
in sight Caught a Porpoise Lat Long

Saturday Oct 10th this day begins with
strong breezes from S.E.W heading S.E
by the wind one sail in sight at 6 P.M.
Hovins strong took in the fore sail &
fore topsail middle moderate made
sail latter brisk breezes from S.E.W
heading S.E by E so ends Lat 38.48
Long 25.16 W

Sunday Oct 11th all these 24 hours
brisk breezes from S. to S.E.W steering
on different tacks by the wind and
some foggy St Michaels in sight
bearing South distance 25 miles
so ends these 24 hours Lat 38.18 N
Long 25.29 W

Monday Oct 12th 1837
This day begins with brisk breezes from S.W
heading West by the wind with all sail set
St. Michaels and one sail in sight
middle part were ship to the E.S.E
latter part wind North the land in sight
at 9 A.M. spoke the bark Bunchin of
Provincetown & months out cobbles so ends
steering for St. Marks so ends

Tuesday Oct 13th this day begins with
strong breezes from S.E steering for St. Marks
one sail in sight at 6 P.M. the South end
of St. Marks bearing S.E by Compass dip 5 miles
middle part rising latter part light air
from East one sail in sight so ends

Wednesday Oct 14th this day begins
with a light air from E saw a large sperm
whale towed the boats the barboard struck and
he took the line chased him until sundown
but without success middle part raining
standing on two hours tacks at 9 A.M. saw
Sp. whales at 10 towed the boats without
success came on board and stood along
after them Lat 36.00 N Long 24.30 W

Thursday Oct 15th first part fine
weather and Sp. whales in sight at 3 P.M.
towed without success at dark came on board
middle calm latter part strong breezes
from N.E and rising at 9 A.M. saw a large
Sp. whale towed the boats the wind struck
and he took the line at 12 am came on
board weather clearing up so ends Lat 35.40 N
Long 24.00 W
