 first part of this day a heavy gale
 from S.E. latter moderated wind cleared S.W.
 at 2 P.M. more ships to S.E., before being in for
 so early this day dark & water. Lat 34. 24 N
 Long 51. 00 W

(Highest Lat 34. 20)
 Wednesday 16th
 this day rugged sea breeze fair
 weather clearing N.E. & S.W. Breeze
 dark green water. Lat 36. 60
 Long 49. 58

Thursday 17th
 this day moderate breeze from
 the N.W. steering by S.W. saw plenty porpoise
 finbacks. one ship W. at night. here too
 from 12 miles N.W. at night. Lat 35. 20 N
 Long 48. 30 W

Friday Nov 18th 1864
 this day a gale from N.W. to S.W.
 moderate breeze to S.W. at 2 P.M. a storm
 32 mph. S.W. whole day, at night light air
 Lat 36. 20 N
 Long 48. 10 W

Saturday Nov 19th 1864
 this day fair weather fresh wind
 from N.W. at day light raised
 a swell. looking darkly from the water. looked
 all round. Wind strong & fast. Porpoise
 & cut whale started. Looked out 4 miles
 but did not see any. at 11. saw a boat (24)
 whale sunk but lost. Talked started at 10 miles
 Lat 36. 50 N
 Long 48. 50 W

Sunday Nov 20th 1864
 this day fair weather at 10 miles
 10.30 all ship at distance. 10 miles N.W. at night
 in cap 9. at night. Lat 36. 60
 Long 48. 30 W
 King of Denmark - 18. 20
