 The 24 hours commenced with calm weather of moderate wind
 with a strong current setting N to the east of 2 miles
 per hour later part light breeze spoke the ship
 1200

Remarks on board Friday June ^{the} 24 1842
 The 24 hours commenced with light breeze from the SE
 cruising for whales saw 1. Sail at a distance
 men employed at ship's duty
 Sat 2 = 20 M

Remarks on board Saturday June ^{the} 25 1842
 The 24 hours commenced with light breeze from the
 SE steering to the NW spoke the ship in yard
 Capt Crocker 19 miles out 650 lbs milk & later
 part light breeze with foggy weather no observation

Remarks on board Sunday June ^{the} 26 1842
 The 24 hours commenced with light breeze from the SE
 cruising for whales spoke the Barge Margraet of
 St Johns 20 miles out 1000 Barge Franklin
 26 miles out 1000 mile & later part light breeze
 no observation

Remarks on board Monday June ^{the} 27 1842
 The 24 hours commenced with light breeze from the SE
 spoke the Barge Margraet part of St Johns at 5 1/2
 miles whaling boat and struck and killed one took him
 a long side bald all hands at daylight but in our
 whale mail sail and blew it away the head 8 30 560

 Sat 2 = 05 M Long 12 = 16 1/2 M

Remarks on board Tuesday June ^{the} 28 1842
 The 24 hours commenced with brisk winds from the SE
 cruising for whales started the works at 12 commenced
 boiling head milk & later part moderate breeze
 finished boiling at 4 Am washed of and commenced
 boiling fat clean Sat 2 = 40 M

Remarks on board Wednesday June ^{the} 29 1842
 The 24 hours commenced with brisk winds from the
 SE steering to the NW 8 miles & later part
 brisk wind with cloudy weather
 Sat 3 = 13 M

Remarks on board Thursday June ^{the} 30 1842
 The 24 hours commenced with brisk winds from the
 SE cruising for whales and a thick fog east
 at day light wore ship and steam 11 12 1/2 M
 later part moderate winds
 Sat 3 = 20 M

Remarks on board Friday June ^{the} 31 1842
 The 24 hours commenced with moderate breeze from
 the SE beginning WSW men employed at ship's duty
 at daylight commenced stowing down oil ends with light
 winds Sat 3 = 04 M

Remarks on board Saturday July ^{the} 1 1842
 The 24 hours commenced with moderate breeze from
 the SE all hands employed stowing down oil milk
 and later part moderate winds
 Sat 2 = 50 M

Remarks on board Sunday July ^{the} 2 1842
 The 24 hours commenced with moderate breeze from
 the SE cruising for whales spoke the ship Mirren
 Smith of New Bedford Capt Brownell 30 miles out 1400
 mile & later part brisk breeze and a thick
 fog Sat 2 = 52 M

Remarks on board Monday July ^{the} 3 1842
 The 24 hours commenced with strong breeze from the
 SE cruising for whales saw breachers at distance mile
 & later part strong breeze men employed at ship's duty
 all the 24 hours thick fog east

Remarks on board Tuesday July ^{the} 4 1842
 The 24 hours commenced with strong breeze from the SE
 cruising for whales took in a quantity of galathea sail at
 1 mile & later part moderate winds
 saw blackfish & porpoises
 Sat

Remarks on board Wednesday July ^{the} 5 1842
 The 24 hours commenced with light breeze from the SE
 cruising for whales spoke ship Snyrna Capt Miller
 6 miles out 200 lbs of seal milk and & later part
 light winds Sat 3 = 23 M
