the as 24 hours commences with strong winds from the
N^W took in sail at dark middle & later part strong
breezes the watch employed at ship's duty

Remarks on board Sunday May ^{the} 21 1843
the as 24 hours commences with strong winds from the
N^W & hailing to the S^W & later part took in fore
& main top sails at dark and before part the main
top sail & spanker and main sail middle &
later part light winds and fine weather saw finbacks
Sat 22 = 24 N

Remarks on board Monday May ^{the} 22 1843
the as 24 hours commences with light breeze from the ESE
hailing N^W shortened sail at dark middle & later part
moderate breezes and fine weather the watch employed
at ship's duty Sat 23 = 24 N

Remarks on board Tuesday May ^{the} 23 1843
the as 24 hours commences with moderate winds from
the SSE hailing & shortened sail at dark middle
& later part moderate winds and all sail at daylight
and steared to S saw porpoises
Sat 24 = 25 N

Remarks on board Wednesday May ^{the} 24 1843
the as 24 hours commences with moderate winds from the
South and fine weather steared to until dark then
took in sail and left on the wind hailing ESE
middle & later part moderate breezes and fine weather
Sat 25 = 26 N

Remarks on board Thursday May ^{the} 25 1843
the as 24 hours commences with moderate winds from the
S steaming to saw squid and finbacks took in sail
at dark middle & later part light winds and saw many
mailed all sail at day light and steared to the ESE
wind at 11 AM raised whales 4 points of the
weather bar and a miles of got dinner
Sat 26 = 27 N Long 152.01 f

Remarks on board Friday May ^{the} 26 1843
the as 24 hours commences with light breezes from the S^W at 2 PM
board but could not come up with them middle & later
part light winds and fine weather saw 1 number finbacks
Sat 27 = 28 N

Remarks on board Saturday May ^{the} 27 1843
the as 24 hours commences with light breezes from the SE
and fine weather middle & later part the same saw 1
great number of flocks of squid bant & fainted the watch
employed at ship's duty Sat 28 = 29 N

Remarks on board Sunday May ^{the} 28 1843
the as 24 hours commences with light breezes from the South
and fine weather took in sail at dark middle part calm
later part light breezes and fine weather saw grasshoppers and
finbacks and birds Sat 29 = 30 N

Remarks on board Monday May ^{the} 29 1843
the as 24 hours commences with breezes and fine weather
and at cruising for whales saw 1 number of finbacks
and porpoises birds & 4 miles & later part moderate winds
at 9 AM saw one sail at distance about the spanker and
commenced mending it Sat 30 = 31 N

Remarks on board Tuesday May ^{the} 30 1843
the as 24 hours commences with moderate winds from the
ESE and at cruising for whales spoke the ship Susan
of N^W Newburyport Capt. Thorland 24 months out 500 tons
but the spanker and shortened sail at dark middle &
later part brisk breezes mailed sail at daylight and
steared SE saw 1 sail at distance
Sat 31 = 17 N

Remarks on board Wednesday May ^{the} 31 1843
the as 24 hours commences with fresh breezes from the
SSE steaming SE took in sail at dark middle &
later part brisk breezes at 9 AM raised breeches
10 miles of run for them and they proved to be sperm
whales at 9 AM boat struck and killed one and chased
the others with 1 boat and so ends the as 24 hours
Sat humps and the young humps

Remarks on board Thursday May ^{the} June 1 1843
the as 24 hours commences with brisk winds at 1 PM took
1 whale & long side got dinner and went of after 8 o'clock
at 4 o'clock and 1/2 took him & long side and cut
in one whales body middle part brisk breezes at day
light killed all heads and cut in one whale and the other
head cleared & way the heads and started the winds &
ends with strong winds from the S^W Long 155.47
Sat 29 = 30 N
