

Remarks on board Friday June 2nd 1843

There 24 hours commenced with strong gales from the S.W. and squalls. neither all hands employed boiling and taking care of oil saw one sail at distance at 1 P.M. took in the fore & misen top sails and lost rest the main and took in the spanker middle & later part strong gails all hands employed boiling and setting up 18 hooks

Remarks on board Saturday June 3rd 1843

There 24 hours commenced with strong gails from the S. boiling out oil under lost rest main top sail and the lee clew of the fore sail the cooper employed setting up shooks middle & later part strong gails

Remarks on board Sunday June 4th 1843

There 24 hours commenced with strong gails from the S.W. all hands employed boiling oil at 4 P.M. took the fore sail and finished boiling & washed up at 6 o'clock saw a large whale low struck and drank & struck & gain and bid 1 whale took him a long side at 9 P.M. and hoisted the boats up on the upper beams and lashed them middle part heavy gails at daylight got up the barrels and commenced stowing in with strong winds and a heavy sea

Remarks on board Monday June 5th 1843

There 24 hours commenced with with strong winds from the N.W. with a heavy sea all hands employed stowing down oil saw down at 10 miles part light arose with a heavy sea at daylight commenced cutting and finished at 10 and commenced blowing it way the head and started the works commenced boiling head

Remarks on board Tuesday June 6th 1843

There 24 hours commenced with calm weather with a heavy swell all hands employed boiling and cutting up of soap finished cutting up head at 3 washed up & 6 miles part boiling winds and plenty of rain later part the same got up at 10 saw the ship works and so ended there 24 hours all hands employed boiling oil and no observation there 24 hours

Remarks on board Wednesday June 7th 1843

There 24 hours commenced with boiling winds from all parts of the compass and plenty of rain all hands employed boiling oil middle & later part strong gails finished boiling at 11 P.M. at daylight hooked out out bottom decks after hoops & 6 the cooper employed repairing bark

Remarks on board Thursday June 8th 1843
There 24 hours commenced with strong breezes from the S.E. and attended with squalls of rain all hands employed at ship's duty and a bark of shootheads & hoops the cooper employed repairing bark at 4 P.M. heavy squalls from the S.E. took in the fore & misen top sails and lost rest the main top sail took the 1st middle & later part brisk breezes at daylight main sail saw finbacks hooked out and got 10 o'clock shooks and commenced setting of them up

Remarks on board Friday June 9th 1843
There 24 hours commenced with strong breezes from the S. heaving S.E. saw breeches the watch employed setting up shooks took in sail at dark middle part strong breezes at daylight main sail and steam saw finbacks later part mairait breezes
Lat 30-25 N

Remarks on board Saturday June 10th 1843
There 24 hours commenced with brisk breezes from the N.W. heaving S the watch employed setting up shooks saw finbacks middle & later part mairait winds and calms with plenty of rain
Lat 29-47 N

Remarks on board Sunday June 11th 1843
There 24 hours commenced with boiling winds from all parts of the compass and plenty of rain the watch employed at ship's duty middle part mairait winds and plenty of rain later part light arose from the Eastward steady W.S. 35
Lat 30-03 N

Remarks on board Monday June 12th 1843
There 24 hours commenced with light arose from the S.E. Eastward and fine weather breezing for whales took in sail at dark middle & later part fresh gails and blowing neither at 12 saw spoke the ship Balanor of New Bedford 14 months out 400 lbs Capt Manchester
