

Remarks On Board Bark Lancer Of New Bedford

Sunday March 10th 1878
Commenced with fresh breezes
and fine weather from N.W.
Course S.E. W all sail. Middle the
same course S.W. by S at daylight
Saw the land bearing N.W. by W and
N.W. W dist about 25 miles off
Eyes with light air and baffling
mostly from the Northward

Took in the large
Cutting Stage and
Bow Boat

Monday March 11th
Commenced with calm and light
air from N.W. by E course S.W. by S
Middle fresh breeze from N.W. by W
Eyes light and thick barometer very
low took in sail at noon and
struck aback fresh sail and fair
rain from S.E. hazy to close reef
Main top sail and storm stay sails
No Obs

again Capt Fisher
offered to let the men
out of bonds if he
would behave him-
self he would not
give a satisfactory
he is still in bonds

Tuesday March 12th
Commenced a strong sail from S.E.
Seymour Jack to the Eastward Middle
bad weather Ends calm and light
air from all parts of the compass
Barometer low Saw 2 sails

We have a man
that has bitten
had 3 last night
and to day

Wednesday March 13th
Commenced calm clear weather Middle
part light breezes from the N.W. course
S.W. by S Eyes with thick and rainy
weather looking bad and threatening
took in and made sail a number
of times one sail in light

Long 65.00 W

Capt James H. Fisher ^(Master) Towards Cape Horn

Thursday March 14th 1878
Commenced with light airs and
thick rainy barometer low weather
looking bad at 7 close reefed the top sails
and handed the fore sail cleared out the
boats for bad weather Middle fresh
sail from S Ends the same with heavy
squalls of slight and rain handed
fore top sail

Friday March 15th
Commenced with strong sail and
a heavy sea from S at 4 AM it
moderated some close reefed
fore top sail under way to S.W.
heading S.E. Middle fresh breezes and
squalls from the Westward at daylight
Saw Staten Land bearing W.S.W. dist
30 miles Eyes with light air and
baffling from W.W. to W.S.W. at
midnoon the same W.W. dist
14 miles

Saturday March 16th
Commenced with light breezes
from W again veering to S.W. with
squalls thick bad weather saw
one sail Middle moderate breezes
and frequent snow squalls Ends
with a fresh sail and snow & hail
squalls from S.W. Saw 4 large ships
borne to the Eastward the ship under
double and close reefed top sail
heading to the Westward
