Tuesday April 27th 1880
Thick weather getting the boat ready
No Communication with the shore

Wednesday April 28th
Thick weather and calm all ready
for sea No chance to get out

Thursday April 29th
Commenced thick foggy and calm
got all ready when the breeze struck
from the S.E. and I have sheeted
sails at Meridian sheeted home got
under way

Friday April 30th
Shine weather from S. stood out of the
Bay got outside at 5. Stronger weather
after Charles Middlebrook. Breeze and
light from the Southward employed a
getting ready for making

Saturday May 1st 1880
Commenced with light breeze from S
breeze W by N all sail and light
and baffling air
Lat 34° 59' S
Long 75° 45' W

Sunday May 2nd
Commenced with light baffling air
and calm breeze with light breeze from
N.W.
Lat 35° 26' S
Long 76° 32' W

Monday May 3rd 1880
2 men show symptoms of the
Small Pox Commenced with light breeze from N.W.
heading N.E. by N all sail and light
breeze from N.W. by the wind to the Westward
all sail saw many Blackfish & Porpoises
Lat 35° 31' S

Tuesday May 4th
Commenced with light breeze and
hazy from N.W. to the Westward by the
wind all sail saw a number of Suffer
Bottoms and thick and hazy from W to
N.W. built 2 Beaths in the blubber room and
put one of the men down there think he has
got the Small Pox steering to the Eastward
Lat 35° 42' S
Long 76° 30' W

Wednesday May 5th
Commenced with thick raining weather
from N.W. breeze to S. cloudy and
light breeze from N.W. by S
breeze to S

Thursday May 6th
Thick hazy weather from N.W. by N
breeze to S. saw 2 sail and a number
Suffer Bottoms and thick and raining
Lat 36° 56' S

Friday May 7th
The Small Pox Patient is better Commenced with thick raining
wider raining from N to S breeze
to the Westward and thick from the
Eastward heading to N.W.
Lat 36° 59' S
