

Remarks On Board Bark Lancer Of

Thursday Jan 6th 1881
Commenced with heavy weather
from W. to W. at 12 o'clock up
fine weather. Perhaps at 10 o'clock
to N.E. dist 25 or 30 miles off the
coast in light breeze with strong
and light breeze from W.

Friday Jan 7th
Commenced with fine weather
from W. to W. and in light breeze
many clouds & rain
breeze with strong breeze and thick
foggy and fine rain from W.S.W.

Saturday Jan 8th
Commenced with strong breeze
and squally with rain, nothing
in sight. Middle squally & was
calm and foggy.

Sunday Jan 9th
Commenced with thick rain, and
squally from W. to N. nothing in sight.
Middle the same breeze with light breeze
and calm. Lat 43.29 S
Long 75.34 W

Monday Jan 10th
Commenced with light breeze and
fine clear weather from W. to S. saw
the land bearing S.S.E. only thick
foggy and fine rain from W.S.W.
and sail in sight.

Tuesday Jan 11th 1881
Commenced with strong breeze and
thick rainy weather from W.S.W. at 7
a fresh Gale close reefed sails and
storm stay sails tensed with thick and
heavy weather from S.W. W.S.W.

Wednesday Jan 12th
Commenced with thick and foggy with fine
rain from W.S.W. and then clear from
S.W. sailed with Lueretia

Thursday Jan 13th
Fine weather from S.W. steamed in for
the Island to 10 miles bearing S.E. & S.
Saw many Sulphuretted fumes with
fine weather from the Southwestern
steamed close in to the Island sailed
with the Europa & Lueretia

Friday Jan 14th
Fine weather from S.E. and strong
breeze saw many Humboldt birds
throughout the 24 hours the same
at midnight close in to the Island.

Saturday Jan 15th
Commenced with strong breeze
and fine weather from S.E. off and
on the Island. Sailed with heavy
Lueretia saw Whales Master B.B. thought
got stone and about one hour & B.B. thought
that some Whales passed him Lueretia
sailed with Lueretia a whale B.B. badly stone
the Lueretia
