 August 5th 1833

 Long 70° 15'

First part Calm - Middle & latter part
 light breezes from the N.E. and very
 pleasant. Flood to the N.W. -
 at half past 12 noon - Charles Corbet died
 after a lingering sickness of four months
 at half past 12 buried him in the deep
 No ends this day ++++++

Saturday
 August 6th 1833
 Lat 36° 28'
 Long 71° 20'

All this day light breezes from N.E. to N.W.
 Flood to the N.W. with very pleasant
 weather at 10 A.M. run out of the
 Gulf and had different coloured
 water - saw three sails - No ends this
 day -

Sunday
 August 7th 1833
 Lat 37° 14'
 Long 71° 20'

All this day Very Moderate & pleasant
 wind from the Eastward - water changed
 some - saw many vessels -
 No ends this day - saw blackfish -

Monday
 August 8th 1833
 Lat 38° 26'
 Long 71° 20'

All this day light winds from East & South
 and very pleasant steered North and N.E.
 Got out the anchors - saw several sails -
 No ends this day -

Tuesday
 August 9th 1833
 Lat 40° 00'
 Long 71° 00'

All this day fine pleasant breezes
 from S.E. to S.W. Steered S.W. by N. and
 N.E. at 9 A.M. spoke ship Admiral
 of England 1600 tons -
 No ends this day -
 at 12 M. got bottom 35 fathoms -
 grey sand & shells - white H.

Gulf of Florida by Henry Cleveland Ship Commodore
 Wednesday
 August 7th 1833
 Lat 40° 58'
 Long 71° 41'

Begins with moderate breezes and
 Cloudy weather - at 6 P.M. spoke
 brig across of Boston House Master
 same time began to rain wind
 at 8 P.M. - at 8 P.M. -

N.E. & E. with the wind from South
 to N.E. and some rain - latter part
 of the night fine pleasant weather
 got 27 fathoms water - at 5 A.M.
 saw Montock light house bearing N.W.
 12 miles distant - at 8 A.M. black island
 bearing N.E. & S. 20 miles -
 saw many craft of various kinds
 No ends this day -

Thursday
 August 8th 1833
 Lat 38° 33'

Begins with light airs from the
 Southward and fine pleasant
 weather at 3 P.M. took a Pilot black
 Island bearing North 6 miles dist
 at 12 entered the passage at
 New port beat until 3 A.M.
 and run out again tide and
 wind a head at 6 entered again
 at 10 let go the anchor in Easter
 harbour - No ends this day -
