

Bark Louisa, Bound to the Okhotsk Sea

" Friday May 6th 1859

For these 24 hours wind from the west
thick squally weather, steering by the wind
on different tacks nothing doing.

" No Observation "

" Saturday 7th "

For these 24 hours squally weather
a thick fog, and cold wind West
course S.W. by S, under short sail
by the wind on different tacks

" Lat per Obs 42.42 North

" Sunday 8th "

For these 24 hours a thick foggy
wind from the S.W. steering by the
wind under short sail on 6 hour tacks

" No Observation "

" Monday 9th "

For the first & middle part of these
24 hours thick rainy weather under
short sail spoke ship Splendid of Cold Spring
Later part the same wind, S.W.
reading N.W. by the wind

" Lat per Obs 42.40 N Long 157.30 East

" Tuesday 10th "

For these 24 hours most moderate made
sail steering by the wind on different
tacks at 10 A.M. raised the land on the
weather beam ship Splendid off the beam

" Wednesday 11th "

Commenced with a strong breeze from the
S.W. steering by the wind under all sail the
passage on the weather bow distance 35 miles
bearing West 2 sail in sight

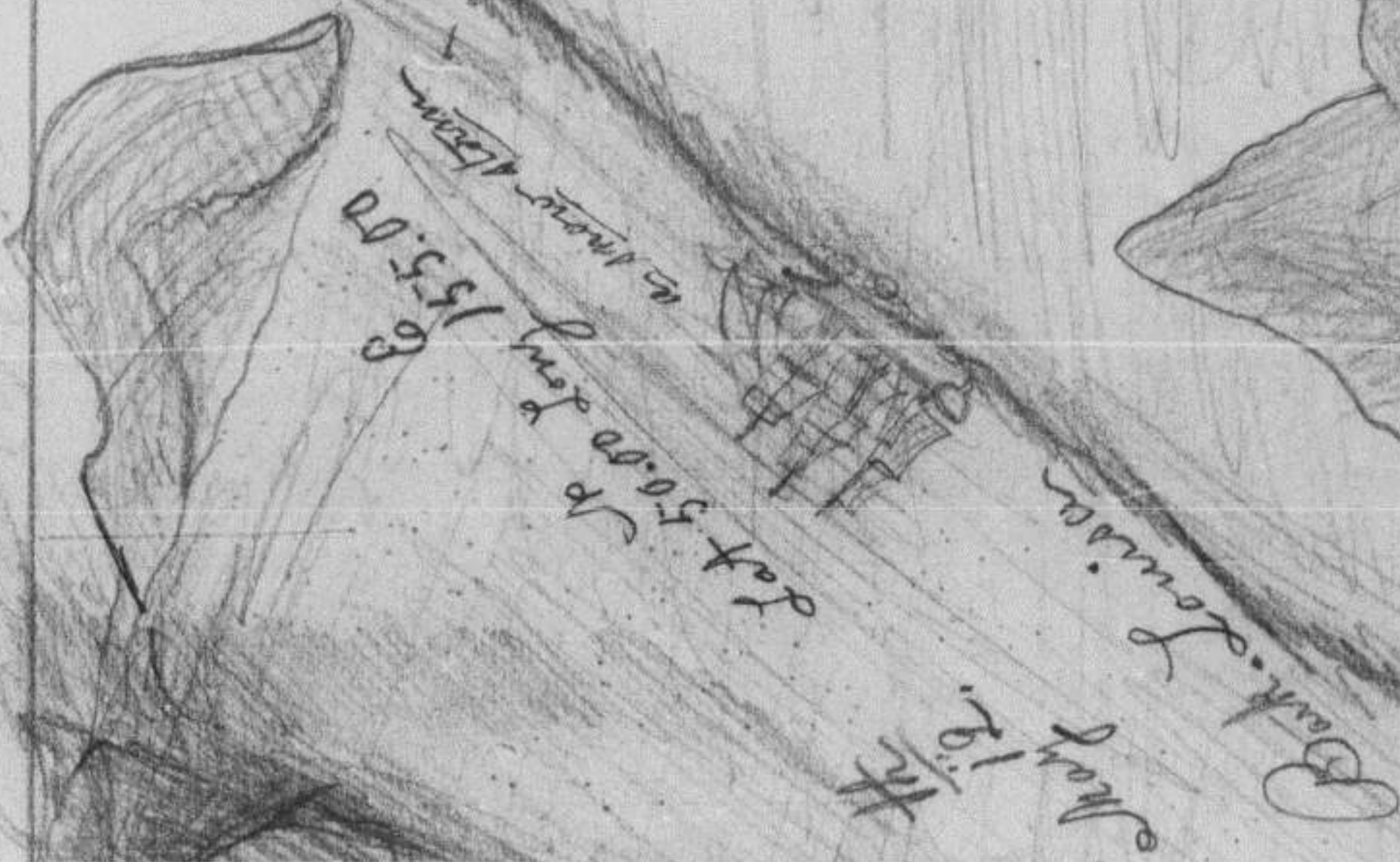
Later part a light breeze from the N.E. steering
West through the Straits 4 sail in
sight the land covered with snow

Thursday 12th May

For the "first" part of these 24 hours
becalmed in the Straits 4 sail in sight
middle part a light breeze from the
East steering W. by N. through the passage
in a thick snow storm spoke ship
Oliver Crocker of New Bedford bound N.
Later part the same " decks covered
with snow ship Splendid & Oliver Crocker
in sight
