Thursday Commenced With light Breezes from S.W.
June 16 At 4 P.M. Calm. lowered all 3 boats to
To exercise the men in pulling down
Kept ship S.E. latter part. brisk winds saw
A. Sail off the boat, steering to the Westward

Friday Comm. With Brisk Winds from the S.W. Co.
June 18 S.E. at Sun set shortened sail latter part
Strong winds double reef top sails, stood on

Lat. N. Long 41.

Saturday Comm. With Strong Winds from S.W. saw a
June 19 Sail to windward standing N.E. at 4 P.M.
Blowing very hard, took fore top sail and luff
To the wind latter part took fore sail in and
Set the top sail blowing a gale. To End then 24.50

Sunday Comm. With Strong Winds from S.E. Rather Cloudy
June 20 A heavy swell of sea from the Westward. Wind hauled
To the S.W. Co. S.E. Middle part lying too
Under close reef main top sail and fore top mast
Stay sail latter part same. To End then 20 ho.

Monday Begins With a heavy swell from the W. Cloudy
June 21 Went from S at 2 P.M. kept ship off to E. on
Account of a suspicious looking Schooner the
Capt. supposed her to be a Privateer. Chased off our
weather quarter. She bearing down for us at 7
P.M. which fog and blowing hard Brought the ship
To the wind. Weather part a gale. took in main top
And lashed ship and stood to the Westward

Wednesday Comm. With Light Winds and Cloudy weather at
June 23 Day light made all sail and stood down for
the Azores. At 12 noon close into the land. took
fore top gallant sail and fly luff. Standing off and on
Sent a boat ashore to trade for provisions at 1 P.M.
Spoke Sch. Franklin S.E. No Oil at 5 P.M. boat came
On board with Potatoes, Onions and Fruits and
One large Neg. paid in Black fish Oil, at Sun set
Came on blowing shortened sail and stood off spoke
Nothing saw a ship standing S.E. and ship in bow
Steaming to the S.W. saw several Finbacks whaling
