1837

Saturday June 24 at daylight. Here Short and
June 24 Loosed the sails at 9 got under way in Company.
 With Ship Triton winds from the S. Whistling to the
 S. W. at 2 P. M. Saw a sail standing in shore
 Thoma Signal. (an American, latter parts same)

Lat. 1.40 N. Long. 80.30 W.

Sunday June 25 Cont. With light winds (trades) from S. W. latter
 Part wind fresh strong to N. in Co. with Ship
 Triton saw a sail standing off shore lashed and
 stood to the S. E. Saw land a head as lat. near Seng.

Wednesday June 28 First part of this 3 days light winds from S. W. W.
 Standing in Co. with Ship Triton to the E. Saw 3
 sails. Latter part strong trades, strong to the W.
 At 8 A. M. took in top gallant sails. At 5 P. M. came
 On Morning, had single top sail. At 6 hauled
 up main sail, and till. Spoke Ship Triton. So ended.

Lat. 2.59 N. Longitude 81.50 W.

Friday June 30 These last 48 hours blowing heavy from the South
 So saw no Spots. At 8 A. M. lashed Ship and stood
 To the W. at 1 P. M. lashed again to the S. E. Ended.

Lat. 2.25 N. Longitude 83.25 W.

July

1837

Saturday July 1 Cont. With strong winds from S. at 8 A. M. saw
 3 or 4 Whales off the quarter. Ship Triton in sight, at
 10 A. M. all boats and gun Choke at 10 A. M. the
 Starboard Javelin Boat got faster the Triton boat. One
 of them pulled up and got fast. Lashed to the same
 Whales killed him and laid too like the Ship came to
 stand got the whale along side and came cutting him
 At 4 finished. Made sail and began to boil. Capt.
 of Ship Triton on board of us and staying S. W. Ended.
 At 8 P. M. Capt. Carr. went on board this Ship
