

Tuesday Nov 3rd 1844
Began with thick and squally weather
the wind from E clearing on the wind Lat 33 37 N
to the S broke out for a brief
space at 6 P.M. clear and calm Lat 49 10 W
and much fresh and freshened the mackerel
and so ends

Wednesday Nov 4th 1844
Began with light breeze from N.W. to S.W.
by 9 course E.S.E. and a choppy water took Lat 33 49 N
in the forenoon and put a new
one on the sprits broke out the fore sail Lat 49 20 W
to middle part of breeze from S by E
heading on the wind to the eastward
latter part the same and so ends

Thursday Nov 5th 1844
Began with fine breeze from S by E
steering S.E. by compass saw one sail Lat 33 57 N
steering E middle part wind from S.W.
S.W. pleasant weather latter part the
same employed in ships duty and
so ends

Friday Nov 6th 1844
Began with fine breeze from the N
course E.S.E. employed in setting up rigging
saw a sail steaming at 5 P.M. four hours Lat 32 37 N
steaming S.W. and latter part the
same steering S.E. saw a school of
grampas saw a big steering S.E. by
compass set the main top gallant studding sail
Brown sail with the bar combant so
ends

Saturday Nov 7th 1844
Began with fine breezes from N.W. to E
steering S.E. 2 P.M. a large steamer passed Lat 32 07 N
us steering S.W. by E 4 hrs on hour the bar
employed in setting up rigging middle
part squally with waves double the
topsails and furled the mizen sail felt wind
from N.W. to E latter part the same at 9
P.M. were ship in the C. and
so ends

Sunday Nov 8th 1844
Began with thick and heavy variable winds
from N.W. to E middle part the same latter
part fine weather with fresh breezes from E.S.E.
made all sail steering to the S.W. by E Lat 40 21 W
and so ends

Monday Nov 11th 1844
Began with fine weather with variable
winds at 2 P.M. were ship to the S at 6 Lat 31 26 N
P.M. thick squally weather with rain at
7 took in all sail 8 P.M. coast west moon
broad and four sail at 9 P.M. set double
reef to fore's latter part fine weather with
breezes from S.W. to S steering S.E. employed
in picking over potatoes shocked the lettuce
pen and took it on deck the sick men
on duty and so ends

Tuesday Nov 12th 1844
Began with fine weather light breezes from
N.W. to S steering S.E. No 4 P.M. set Lat 30 22 N
the four topsails steering S.W. employed in
picking over potatoes and building a storage Lat 37 37 W
middle and latter part fresh breezes from
S.W. steering S.E. with all sail set
sail in sight at 7 P.M. saw a school of
black fish and four hours employed in picking
over crews bracing out for water setting up
rigging and so ends

Wednesday Nov 13th 1844
Began with fresh breezes and fine weather
from N.W. steering S.E. employed in
various jobs middle and latter part the
same and so ends no observation

Thursday Nov 14th 1844
Began with fresh breezes from N.W.
steering S.E. at 4 P.M. rain squalls took Lat 27 27 N
in fore's topsails steering S.W. and closed down
the fore's at 5 P.M. whole topsails again
at 6 P.M. doubled under the fore's at 7 P.M.
furled the mizen fore's heavy squalls from
the north latter part more moderate set
double reef to fore's employed in various jobs
and so ends

Friday Nov 15th 1844
Began with fresh gale from the north W
steering S.E. by S under double reef topsails Lat 25 54 N
at 2 P.M. passed and eng. led back steering
to the eastward at 6 P.M. took 1 mile Lat 30 50 W
all the mizen topsails set the mizen topsails
middle and latter part were moderate wind
from N.W. to W saw 2 sails employed
in bracing out for top's end ports
and so ends
