

Bank Mars from New Bedford
Thursday August 5th 1841

these 24 hours begins with moderate
breezes from NW running down for
Fogal middle and last part stormy
with Calms at 12 M the SW end
of Fogal here last got lat 38-31

Friday August the 6th 1841

the 24 hours in baffling winds and
Calms have been and ranged a boat
here with baffling Wind and Calms
at 4 AM went on shore with the boat
at Fogal but could get nothing to
recruit with left Mr Canning
and E J Thompson with the General
and Manuel King descent

Saturday August 7th 1841

Commences with light baffling airs and
Calms run through the passage between
Fogal and Pie at 8 AM got down off point
where went on shore lay off and on the
rest of the day we getting recruits at the
Ala de velas

Sunday August 8th 1841

the 24 hours moderate breezes and
fine weather being off and on at St Georges
got our recruits at midnight and bore up
the fore the Wind to the last run out between
St Georges and Pie took on board 4 men
Wind at North and NW
Obs in lat 38-12

towards Pacific Ocean A Brownell (Capt)
Monday August 9th 1841

Commences with fine breeze from the NW
fair weather here too to the West of St
Michaels had baffling Wind from N last
part baffling airs and Calms at 12 M the
Michaels here NW lat 37-41 North

Tuesday August 10th 1841

Commences with a Calm off SW end of
Michaels at day light got a breeze run to N
at 12 M the St Marks here NW lat 37-41
breaking out mist covering it
Lat of the 37-16

Wednesday August 11th 1841

Commences with light breeze and clear weather
headed to South latter part Calm
saw a ship to NW
Lat 36-22 Long 24-41-11 W lat

Thursday August 12th 1841

the 24 hours begins light breezes and
fair weather to last part Calms
Lat 35-36-11 Long 24-33 W lat

Friday August 13th 1841

Commences with a Calm started
the M said unburst the fore sail that
being too deep bent the other the
last part had a light breeze from
the NW lat 35-15 N Long 23-54 lat 24-12
