

Bark Mass from N Bedford

Monday Dec 6th 1841

These 24 hours begins light airs from NW cloudy but part at South clear high melt from NW Bar on 30 to 30.01
Lat Obs 33-56.1 Long 112-20.8 E

Tuesday Dec 7th 1841

Commences with moderate breezes cloudy middle to latter fair with fresh breezes.

At 5 AM saw sperm whale going quick to the West Ward lowered the boats but they stopped as and went of quick to West Ward was off a boat 3 hours West about South 24 hours it is hard not to get any when we have been looking over 6 months for them Bar on 29.09 for the large whales 34-07 Long 114-00 E

Wednesday Dec 8th 1841

Commences with strong breezes at South. At 1 PM saw the land islands to the West of Cape Lervie double reefed down at 4 PM took in all sail tucked up Home Land 20 miles but middle and last part strong breezes and clear weather headed to NW the rest 24 hours Wind NE to NW Bar rising up to 30.02
Lat 34-42.1 Long 113-36.8 E

Thursday Dec 9th 1841

Commences with strong breezes from SE headed to NW fair weather middle light airs and calms At 7 PM more ship to NE Bar on 30-42.09 At 9 AM took a breeze from West fair weather
Lat Obs 34-50.1 Long 113-20.8 E

Towards Pacific Ocean A Brownell

Friday Dec 10th 1841

Commences with light breezes from NW fair weather steered NE at sundown shifted two to NW middle light airs and cloudy At 8 AM wind shifted in a squall suddenly too South from NW took us a rack lowered down the sails took in jib and spanker headed to West at 1 PM more ship to East Bar rose suddenly from 29.09 to 29.10 before squall but fell to 29.09 about an hour
Lat Dr 34-30.1 Long 113-40.8 E

Saturday Dec 11th 1841

These 24 hours strong breezes from South fair weather but rugges saw a brig steering NW to saw a ship to NW Bar on 30.24.09
Lat Obs 35-39.1 Long 114-13.8 E

Sunday Dec 12th 1841

These 24 hours strong breezes from South with some squalls but the most part clear At 9 AM more ship to West and spoke the ship Gen Pike of N Bedford July 150 kbls Bar on 30.11 the 24 hours with to 30.22.09 Long 114-14.06 E

Monday Dec 13th 1841

These 24 hours strong gales from South with a high sea the greater part cloudy At 1 PM saw the land Cape Naturalist headed in to East under short sail at 5 PM more ship off shore to West Cape bearing by 15 miles but Bar on 30 to 30.01
Lat Dr 35-20.1 Long 114-00 E
