

Bark Mars from N Bedford

Friday Feb 18th 1842
Commences with light winds from
NNE middle and last part lat to 51° 14'
Bar 30-00 Lat 32-51 Long 166-31 E. Gro

Saturday Feb 19th 1842
Commences with light breezes from the
East fair weather latter strong breezes
headed to South & saw a Bark that
showed English Colours Bar 29-09
Lat 32-50 Long 166-12 E. Gro

Sunday Feb 20th 1842
Commences with fresh breezes from NE
middle and last part moderate standing
Whole Watches Sidney Crocker down with
scurvy and had a hard night of it with
the Rheumatis my self spoke an
English Bark but could not learn
who she was and too dark to see Bar 29-09
Lat 33-45 Long 168-08 Lat

Monday Feb 21st 1842
These 24 hours moderate breezes and
squally with some Showers Wind shifted
to NNE Bar stationary until 9 AM 12 Mer 29-08
Lat not to depend on 34-03 Long to 170-13 E

Tuesday Feb 22nd 1842
Commences thick rainy weather sea with
steered to East at 5 AM took in suit bore too
middle thick and stormy at 2 AM Wind shifted
to from NE to NE round from West last part
a strong gale from South fair weather some low
saw an English bark steering West Bar 8 AM 29-08 12 Mer 29-09
Lat 33-48 Long 170-44 E

in Pacific Ocean Whaling

Wednesday Feb 23th 1842
These 24 hours strong gales from the
South East headed to West bore too wide
close reef M top sail fore Spencer at 9 AM
more ship to leeward at 8 AM set fore sail
fore top stay sail double reef M top sail
sea high and bad Bar rising 24 hours 12 Mer 30-03
Lat Obs 33-32 Long 170-50 E. Gro

Thursday Feb 24th 1842
These 24 hours strong gales from SE to SSE
fair weather at 4 AM tacked to NW at 11 AM
made the land suppose it to be 3 Kings Isles
north Cape New Zealand at 12 Mer Bore 118
Bar 30-02 Lat 33-39 Long 171-39 E

Friday Feb 25th 1842
These 24 hours strong and unsteady
Winds from SE with some squalls and
showers at 6 AM tacked with the 3 Kings
bearing N by E 15 miles per headed on
the Eastern tack until 8 AM tacked to NW
at 12 Mer North Cape New Zealand
bore NE Lat 33-54 Long Bar 30 to 30-01

Saturday Feb 26th 1842
These 24 hours strong gales from SE
with heavy squalls and showers have had
from whole top sails to double reefs jib
and spanker in at 4 AM tacked to East North
Cape bearing N by E 15 but on different tack
at 12 Mer North Cape bore N by E 18 but
the Cook rick the 4th one of duty and can't
get in to cure the poor fellows Bar made 30
