Saturday July 30th 1842

There 24 hours light breezes from NE to SE
fair weather sea smooth tacked to S by 12 o'clock
commenced boiling at 2 o'clock continued the rest of the day
Lat 30-33 S Long 169-45 E Cro

Sunday July 31st 1842

There 24 hours light airs from NE to E
fair weather finished boiling oil at 4 o'clock
filled 7 casks 70 lbs at 6 o'clock spoke the
Bark ^{Sullivan} Same of Port Jackson 7 o'clock
out 600 lbs Bar 29.07

Lat 31-02 S Long 169-49 E Cro

Monday August 1st 1842

There 24 hours light airs and calms with
a squall from NE at 10 o'clock lowered the boats
for white water a long boat could see nothing
got on board 12 o'clock Bar 29.09

Lat 31-01 S Long 169-43 E Cro strong current

Tuesday August 2nd 1842

There 24 hours some light baffling
airs but mostly calm at day light
commenced stowing down 2 o'clock in night

Lat 31-05 S no long Bar 29.09

Wednesday August 3rd 1842

There 24 hours begins with a calm middle
and last part moderate breezes from S to SE
stowed down our oil at 6 o'clock both fores 89 lbs

Lat 30-52 S Long 170-02 E Cro Bar 30.00

Pacific Ocean W Luning & Brumwell

Thursday August 4th 1842

Commenced light airs and calms middle calm
last part light air from East fair weather
saw great numbers of fish different kind Bar 30.00
Lat 30-46 S Long 169-36 E Cro

Friday August 5th 1842

There 24 hours begins with light breezes
from the East fair weather last part had
a moderate breeze from SE at 5 o'clock some
Ocean Island bearing W by S have too during
the night run down at day light had a lot
of canvas a long ride found we could get
no Wood some of the crew determined
to go on shore the third mate at the head
of it hauled to South Cro 50 mile to port
Lat by Uls 31-03 S Long 169-49 E Cro

Saturday August 6th 1842

There 24 hours moderate breezes from SE
to SE with some squalls and showers
at 7 o'clock tacked to NE Bar 29.09

Lat 31-54 S Long 169-38 E Cro

Sunday August 7th 1842

There 24 hours fresh trades and squally
at 5 o'clock tacked to South continued on the
tack the rest 24 hours Bar 29.09

Lat 32-42 S Long 169-08 E Cro

Monday August 8th 1842

There 24 hours fresh and unsettled winds and squalls
and showers from SE to NE strong current to West
Bar 29.12 Lat 34-04 S Long 168-47
