Friday Dec 2nd 1842

Commenced with light baffling winds and variable with some light showers finished boiling at 3 PM turned up 54 lbs middle squally wind at South with thunder light rising heavy showers last part fair gale at 11 PM Bar 29.05 & 12 AM & 11 rising 12 AM 29.08 Lat 46 29-12 W

Saturday Dec 3rd 1842

These 24 hours a strong gale from NW have too under the Spencer close reefed top sail headed to East during the night sea high Bar rising gradually 12 AM 29.09 Lat 46 29-17 S Long 177-47 & 18 W

Sunday Dec 4th 1842

Commenced strong gale high sea middle more moderate Wind NW last part light Winds from NW clear Bar 30- Lat 46 29-08 S Long 177-17 & 18 W strong Current to East

Monday Dec 5th 1842

These 24 hours moderate breezes from SE & to NW fair weather on different tacks Coopering our Oil on back Bar 30.1 Lat 28-31 N Long 177-18 & 19 W

Tuesday Dec 6th 1842

These 24 hours light baffling winds and fair weather Winds SE to South Bar 30.1 W at broke out at day light to storm down Oil in main hatchway stormed down 50 lbs Lat 46 28-19 S Long 177-20 & 18 W

Wednesday Dec 7th 1842

These 24 hours light airs from the SE and fair weather stormed down and stormed off at 4 PM have too at night Bar 30 Lat 46 28-31 S Long 177-32 & 33 W

Thursday Dec 8th 1842

These 24 hours light baffling Winds from SE to SE fair weather at 3 PM saw Sunday Island bearing 11 W passed the east end at 12 AM Lat 46 29-13 S Long 177-56 E

Friday Dec 9th 1842

These 24 hours light Winds from NE and clear weather steered off South at day light at 12 AM Reckoned home NW by N Bar 30.1 Lat 46 29-45 S Long 177-31 W E

Saturday Dec 10th 1842

These 24 begins with moderate breezes and clear weather last part begins to freshen Wind at NE at 9 AM saw the Charles Island bearing West 30 Miles Dist at 11 saw Spanish Whale lowered the boat at 11 PM No Obs
