

Bank Mass of New Bedford in

Wednesday May 31st 1843

Commenced with fresh gales fair weather -
middle and last part moderate clear Wind
from SE got off 20 bags 40 Turkeys & back of
guns and potatoes about place to go off and
on but no Water - had place for Wood

Thursday May June 1st 1843

These 24 hours light winds from NW
and clear weather got off from Manzanilla 5
back of guns and potatoes headed them up
on shore and rolled over the reef started at
5 PM with 2 Natives on board run N. by N. W. by N.
at 10 AM ran Roanoke bearing SE by S
broke out the fore sails to stave down
oil got all clear run 2 Cub. Lat 21-34 N

Friday June 2nd 1843

These 24 hours light baffling Winds from
from North to NW Clear weather at 6 AM
Corte bore West home to under short
sail stowed down the oil 22 blbls 3 blbls
left at day light broke out lines clear
to stave off masts and masts
at 12 Mer Corte bore WNW 2 leagues bar
Lat 21-13 N. W.

Saturday June 3rd 1843

These 24 hours begins light winds from the
North middle and last part unsteady winds and
squally from NW to North went on shore to the
harbour on the east side the island found the wind
to blow to back off any thing got on board before
sunset and to squally to vary from 112 Corte SE by E

Pacific Ocean Whaling Abner's Book

Sunday June 4th 1843

These 24 hours begins baffling and unsteady winds
thick squally weather worked round from North into SE
and round SE from 6 AM to 12 heavy rain thunder-
lightning last part light baffling air from SE
the most part cloudy at 12 Mer Corte bore South
10 miles but nothing to be done on shore for 29-05-40

Monday June 5th 1843

Commenced with moderate and baffling breeze
and squally middle and last part strong gale
from SE heavy squalls went on shore on the North
side of Corte but blew so hard could not
off no wood except a little to burn at the fire
at 12 Mer off the SE end of the island

Tuesday June 6th 1843

These 24 hours strong gales from East to SE
squally under double reef for of the time too
heavy from the SE sail fetched in off the
harbour at 12 Mer on the North side of the
island Obs 21-04 N Log 159-59 & Bar 29-09

Wednesday June 7th 1843

These 24 hours strong and unsteady gales from
East to SE squally under double reef Main top
sail close reef fore fore sail M. Spencer stay east
at 10 PM ^{was} to with at 11 AM more ship to SE
half a mile North of N. Harbour at Corte

Obs Lat 21-07 N Log 160-00

the Bar is rising a trifle but the
Wind is rather increasing but less squally
at 12 Mer Bar on 30-01
