

Bank Mass of N Bedford in the

Monday July 31st 1843

There 24 hours moderate and unsteady
breezes and fair weather finished boiling
at 6 P.M. filled 62¹/₂ lbs from cooler
headed to South turned on to Coopering
Winds from ESE to SSE Jan. 29
at 12 M the West end of ^{Jan 29} ~~the~~ bore 138
Lat Obs 13-03 Long 177 06 E

Tuesday August 1st 1843

These 24 hours begins with moderate
breezes from East to NE fair weather middle
baptling and squally but part blowing
strong and squally broke out fine
hole and commenced running down tide
on the Starboard side in make of fore
hatchway and Starboard of it headed
out to NE at 6 till see end of ~~of~~ ^{my} fog
here 11 AM a boat 12 miles from land
no obs

Wednesday August 2nd 1843

there 24 hours strong gales with squalls
had sea heaved to M under double reef. Main
top sail and fore sail until 6 AM finished stowing
to a bunt 4 bbls had no cask to fish get down
58 bbls had to take up on cask 150 gal of the old fore
at day light "M" sail down reef fore top sail
but Oct 12 ~~at~~ A Day 175-10 & Co Ban 29 & 30

Thursday August 3th 1847

Commenced with strong gales from East to West at 6 P.M.
 trucked 15 miles from Opola leaving 11.1 at 1 still more to South
 had strong gales during the night at 8 AM moderate
 kept off to run to the West of Opola 6 or 8 miles from land
 had light baffling Winds under the lee of land saw
 a ship on bank to West she had a breeze went out of
 sight to North ends with a strong gale at 11
 headed out south Bar 29.09 at 50
 Sat Obs 13-30 South

Friday Aug 4th 1843

these 24 hours strong gales from S.W. fair
weather headed to south until 6 AM backed to
N.E. have been under double and close reef the
most part with M sail set Bar 29.45 to 30
Set Obs 14-17 strong 193-45 E.S.O

Saturday August 5th 1843

there 24 hours strong trade from SSW fair
weather tended to the NE until 6 PM backed to
south & Savg leaving NW & La port at 12 Mid
tack to it kept on Northern tack rest of
the day rufed down the whole time at 12 Mer the
West end of St Savg bore North Bar 29-09 & 30
Lat 04 13-50 & Long 141-30 Gro

Sunday August 6th 1843

Commenced with moderate breezes got under the lee of Sargass that occasion it detained 4 hours before we got a bare middle and but for strong gales & greatly heavy showers went on north of Sargass tacked to South & North at 12 o'clock close in with land near that point N. N. W.
