

Bank Mass of New Bedford in

Thursday August 31st 1843
There 24 hours began with a calm
middle moderate breeze from N. E. but
fast boating and squally with showers
of rain ran in under Tottlella to seaward
of the Coxcomb rocks and towed a raft of
empty cask on shore got them all filled
at 12 Men ready to turn off

Friday Sept 1st 1843
There 24 hours fresh and unsteady winds
and squally from N. E. and varying got off
180 bbls Water got all stored down and got
nearly ready for a start to south

Saturday Sept 2nd 1843
Commences with strong breezes from N. E. middle
to fast fast moderate from East at 3 PM
got on board could not make any trade to
advantage came on board ran down passed the
lee end of Tottlella hauled south by the
Wind lbs 15-23 1 long 171-46 10 Cwt but
it is one degree nearly south West than the
Island of Tottle by carries charts

Sunday Sept 3rd 1843
There 24 hours moderate breezes from
N. E. to S. E. headed to south under short
sail during the night at 6 AM saw
spinn Whale to the S. E. of us going N. W.
a large school of small ones and a large one
a boat 3 miles from there gave chase to the
large one lowered at 8 AM 3 track at 10 AM
at 12 AM spauling blew 3 track at 10 AM
at 7 PM 16-23 South long 171-27 9 Cwt

Monday Sept 4th 1843
There 24 hours light Wind from N. E. to S. E.
and fair weather sea smooth at 2 PM got a large
Whale a long side got ready and hooked down to
him raised the piece turned out the gun at 4 PM
at day light were round took him to seaward
got the head off got in the body at 11 AM
a very large carcass and cut very bad got
no lbs but have gone but little since yesterday

Tuesday Sept 5th 1843
There 24 hours light breezes from N. E. to S. E. clear
weather got the head hooked down and took in the
junk commenced hauled the case commenced boiling
at 6 PM at 11 AM saw White water to the south
made all sail but could not quite head for it
lbs 16-45 1 long 173-19 10 Cwt

Wednesday Sept 6th 1843
Commences with moderate breezes and fair
weather Wind at 11 AM all sail is headed to S. W.
saw White Water to Windward not near enough
to see a Whale spout took in sail at 5 PM squally
with light showers middle unsteady winds
boating fast fast strong breezes and squally
winds East to N. E. boiling the 24 hours got the junk
all cut up and boiled to a boat 6 bbls
lbs 16-23 South no long

Thursday Sept 7th 1843
Commences with strong and unsteady winds squally fresh
boiling at 4 PM middle and fast fast gales and
fair weather at day light commenced cooking oil
at 6 PM 16-46 1 long 173-21 10 Cwt
