

Ship Martha Ly Brock in the S. Atlantic Ocean

Remarks on board Sunday 4th Sept 1834.

These 24 hours commenced with fine breezes from the N.E. all sail set standing S.E. a number of sail in sight bound to the south. Middle part the same. Little part wind bore on to the N.W. and began to blow fresh in Bow Street East Lane four royal yards & a mast in sight. 11 o'clock 1300 ft. from new S.E. from sail many top sail. Sparke & for Spencer so early with fresh breeze & rain -

Lat. 38.26 S. 23.10 W.

Remarks on board Monday 5th Sept 1834.

Strong breezes from the N.W. and squally at 10 P.M. Southward of sails. Middle part strong breezes from the N.W. and squalls at 10 P.M. turned the reef on our top sail so early with fresh breezes from the N.W. & continued to the S.E. a Bark ship in sight at 11 o'clock.

Lat. 38.26 S. 20.00 W.

11 Days out.

Remarks on Tuesday 6th Sept 1834.

Fresh breezes from the N.W. by the wind to the S.E. at 2 P.M. sent down main Royal Mast and yard a Bark. Saw a stone and plenty of birds. Middle and latter part fresh breezes from the South by the wind to the Eastward several sail in sight bound to the Eastward. Lat. 38.51 S. -

16 49 W.

Remarks on board Wednesday 7th Sept 1834.

Fresh breezes from the South and squally by the wind to the East. Middle part the same. Latter part more moderate and started to the Westward in place of getting up cutting pendant. Saw one Ship and Bark in sight.

Lat. 38.22 S Long by Chron. 16.31 W.

on the passage out Charles Fisher Master, 1834.

Remarks on board Thursday 8th Sept 1834.

Moderate breezes from the N.W. and somewhat cloudy all morning. Sail set standing S.E. Long sail in sight bound to the S.E. Middle and latter part fresh breezes from the N.W. & squally starting S.E. with all necessary sail set.

Lat. 38.12 S Long by Chron. 13.36 W.

Remarks on board Friday 9th Sept 1834.

Strong breezes and squalls from the N.W. during the day. Middle part wind shifted to the Westward. Latter part heavy squalls from the N.W. to East and Long sail in sight at 10 P.M. Southward of top sail. Quarter gill so early with strong and steady.

No obs this day. 35.06 S 11.20 W.

15 Days out.

Remarks on Saturday 10th Sept 1834.

Strong winds from the East & squalls by the wind to the South under Short sail. at 7 P.M. Southward of top sails fresh gill & main sail. at 11 P.M. main sail at 10 P.M. were ship to the Eastward, latter part rather more moderate and sail so early with fresh breezes from the S.E. squally by the wind to the South.

Lat. 38.38 S Long by Chron. 9.09 W.

Remarks on Sunday 11th Sept 1834.

Strong breezes from the Eastward and cloudy by the wind to the South. Saw a number of Birds of Prey at 10 P.M. shifted to the Eastward. Latter part wind from the S.E. and rather fresh by the wind to the Eastward.

Lat. 37.45 S 9.04 W.
