Saturday  
June 17<sup>th</sup>  
1848.  
Variation 2. E  
These 24 hours commenced with fresh winds from the westward and inclining southerly bearing S S W at 1 P M made sail finished stowing ribs and land at 3 P M we saw 2 or 3 whales going and did not lower saw 7 ships all of them looking over the land at 8 P M the wind in sail bearing S S E fine pleasant weather and smooth. Middle hours light air and smooth at 4 P M made sail and stood to the Northward the land in sight bearing N at 7 P M left off west at 11 saw whales land chad rough latter hours blowing strong from the Eastward and thick could not get hold came on board

Sunday  
June 18<sup>th</sup>  
1848.

These 24 hours commenced with strong gales from the Eastward and rough at 1 P M it came in to rain and the wind increasing saw plenty of whales rough did not lower at 3 P M the wind in sail and rough the main the wind bearing S by W saw 3 ships and mid of them latter whales at 6 P M the wind began to abate whales in sight thick Middle hours strong winds at 4 P M the wind drift off came in thick fog latter hours strong gales and rain the wind hauling westerly

Monday  
June 19<sup>th</sup>  
1848.  
Variation 2. E  
These 24 hours commenced with strong gales from the westward under short sail bearing S E at 3 P M the wind came out from the westward strong saw whales blowing and rough could not lower saw 3 ships at 5 P M it cleared off pleasant and the wind abating. Middle hours strong winds and clear at 6 P M began to abate made sail saw whales land chad could not get hold came on board latter hours wind to the S W light wind saw the land bearing N N W

Tuesday  
June 20<sup>th</sup>

These 24 hours commenced with light winds from the Westward heading S W at 1 P M we saw whales land struck 2 killed one and drew from 1  took her along sides at 4 P M and prepared for cutting at 5 P M we had no wind to the landward fine cutting at 10 at night set the watch and clear up decks at 6 A M made sail light wind and clear stood S W saw 1 sail off the low low Middle hours light winds and clear employed clearing away the head at 6 A M made sail and stood to the S W latter hours light air began to be seen the land bearing N W

Wednesday  
June 21<sup>st</sup>  
1848.  
Variation 2. E  
These 24 hours commenced with light air from the westward heading to the Southward employed boiling saw 2 ships boiling at 7 P M we saw no whales near the ship lower 3 boats chad wild could not get near line could not board took in sail and ship heading S W light the wind hauled to S W light and smooth Middle hours strong winds and mostly clear at daylight made sail the wind light latter hours fresh winds sculler up the fore and mixed topsails had an altercation with an Irishman for not turning out and about and was severely reprimanded for talking in much responsibility upon himself and so the thing drops saw whales land struck both times drew

Thursday  
June 22<sup>nd</sup>

These 24 hours commenced with strong gales from the Eastward heading to the Northward and the main topsails at 3 P M the gale increasing hauled the fore and mixed topsails and fore at 4 P M closed up the main topsails and hauled the foresail up at 5 would down and ship to the Southward made all secure for the night blowing strong & rough Middle hours strong gales and rough at 6 P M moderate cleared the fore and began to be again latter hours strong winds and rough the wind hauling southerly

Friday  
June 23<sup>rd</sup>  
1848.  
Variation 2. E  
These 24 hours commenced with strong gales from the Eastward under short sail the wind heading eastward employed boiling heading S E the wind hauling southerly at 7 P M saw 1 right whale to the westward did not lower blowing heavy and rough set the watch and drew the log with the wind abating Middle hours strong gales and rough paid 1 ship standing to the North latter hours strong gales and rough employed stowing provisions down the main hatch and boiling saw 1 whale blowing did not lower

Saturday  
June 24<sup>th</sup>  
1848.  
Variation 2. E  
These 24 hours commenced with strong gales from the S E heading S E under short sail employed boiling and stowing provisions down the main hatch at 4 P M we were at 4 P M at 7 P M saw 3 right whales going to the Northward the wind abating and mostly clear Middle hours thick and strong winds at 4 P M it came in to rain at 7 P M we went to the Northward and hauled the foresail up latter hours strong gales and thick fog with rain saw 1 right whale
