

Ship Mary & Susan cruising in the Chesote Sea

Monday June 19th 1849. These 24 hours commences with light winds from the S & W variable stirring at 8 P M we saw no ship till 2 o'clock at 4 P M it came in rain at 5 P M we left by the wind and large abastle heading E & S E wind S E Middle hours fresh winds and thick at 5 P M we had full and two to the S & W employed stowing in some aft. Latter hours the fog cleared off saw 5 ships & of them sailing and 1 cutting under the S & W. Lat by Det 57.15 North Long 151.50 East.

Tuesday June 20th 1849. These 24 hours commences with light winds from the S & W heading S & W variable at 3 P M we could see out of Mather's fine & strong wind to the Eastward light air and breathing away Middle hours light winds and cloudy at daylight many all sail and run off at 6 Latter hours light winds from the Southward all hands employed stowing in some aft. Lat by Det 57.40 North Long 153.50 East.

Wednesday June 21st 1849. These 24 hours commences with light winds from the Southward steering N W at 2 P M we saw 10 ships by the wind & S W employed stowing in some aft. The Mather's Mather's New Bedford 1 whale and ship to the Eastward light winds and thick cloudy at 7 o'clock topgallant sails Mather's ran to the S & W at 7 P M we saw large quantities of fish and ship heading E by S Latter hours snow & rain the wind S E Lat by Det 57.50 North Long 151.50 East.

Thursday June 22nd 1849. These 24 hours commences with strong gales from the S & E heading E by S thick snow and rain dark up the topsails saw 1 sail blowing strong and rough and thick snow and rain Middle hours strong gales and thick rain and snow Latter hours the wind light from S E fog and rain Lat by Det 57.55 North Long 152.20 East.

Friday June 23rd 1849. These 24 hours commences with light winds from S & W heading S & W at 1 P M we went to the S W thick fog and rain made the fog at 8 P M took the wind from the Eastward made to the Southward Middle hours light winds and fog at daylight made sail and kept off South Latter hours the wind from N E employed setting up shalloes saw 1 whale chased Lat by Det 57.55 North Long 152.50 East.

Saturday June 24th 1849. These 24 hours commences with fresh winds from the N E steering N W employed in shalloes saw several ships and one took a whale at 8 P M we could see the topsails Middle hours fresh winds from the Northward at daylight made sail and stood to the Eastward spoke the India of New London 11 whales Latter hours the wind abating pleasant weather Lat by Det 57.44 North Long 151.24 East.

Sunday June 25th 1849. These 24 hours commences with light winds from N and pleasant saw 10 ships & of them sailing and sailing at 6 the wind west and light Middle hours light winds heading N E in topgallant sails Latter hours pleasant saw whales chased Lat by Det 57.09 North Long 151.17 East.

Monday June 26th 1849. These 24 hours commences with fresh winds from the North saw whales chased with the Mather's of New Bedford observed 500 fms at 7 P M we saw topgallant sails heading S by S thick fog Middle hours pleasant Latter hours saw 1 whale chased with the Mather's of New Bedford and killed under the S & W along side and killed 1 whale and began to cut on the Lat by Det 57.50 North Long 150.57 East.

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Tuesday June 19th 1849. These 24 hours commences with light winds from the westward finish cutting at 2 P M we cleared up the decks till to the Northward saw ships shading sailing and cutting employed sailing the fog cleared at 7 P M we saw whales chased headed topgallant sails began to sail Middle hours light winds east to the Southward Latter hours light winds and thick cloudy saw 8 or 10 ships all sailing Lat by Det 57.25 North Long 149.48 East.

Wednesday June 20th 1849. These 24 hours commences with fresh winds from the S & W heading to the Southward saw 10 ships of S E the Mather's Phelps of Newington wanting 2 whales to fill at 3 stood in for the ant and smooth employed sailing Middle hours light winds and to the S & W at 5 P M we saw 2 dead whales found his good tooth her along side Lat by Det 57.50 North Long 150.50 East.

Thursday June 21st 1849. These 24 hours commences with fresh winds from the N E ward and thick fog finish cutting at 4 P M we cleared up decks made sail and stood to the Southward began to sail at 5 P M the fog cleared off at 8 P M we took up the fog and Mather's topsails from the fog Middle hours fresh winds and to the S & W Latter hours strong winds from N E and thick fog Lat by Det 57.55 North Long 149.40 East.

Friday June 22nd 1849. These 24 hours commences with fresh winds from the S & W heading N W by S thick fog employed sailing at 3 P M the fog cleared off saw 10 ships and to the Southward and south up the chain topsails made all secure for the night blowing strong and rough thick fog Middle hours strong gales and thick fog Latter hours the same employed stowing in some aft. the wind light Lat by Det 57.50 North Long 150.00 East.

Saturday June 23rd 1849. These 24 hours commences with strong gales from the S & W and thick fog used to the Northward employed sailing and stowing down the run Provisions and all Middle hours the wind light at 6 P M we could see out of Mather's Latter hours light winds and thick fog all hands employed stowing in some aft. Lat by Det 57.42 North Long 151.13 East.

Sunday June 24th 1849. These 24 hours commences with fresh winds from the west ward heading N & W the fog cleared off made sail employed stowing in some aft. saw 5 ships and of them whaling the clear at daylight made sail Middle hours fresh winds and whales all of them going quick Lat by Det 57.51 North Long 150.45 East.

Monday June 25th 1849. These 24 hours commences with pleasant weather the wind S & W light and began to cut saw whales chased shark and killed him took along side and lay by him 5 ships sailing and whaling the light and clear Middle hours fresh winds and clear at daylight light and to the Southward Latter hours the wind fresh and a trawl hauled old sea saw several whales and 10 Lat by Det 57.37 North Long 151.27 East.
