

Ship Mary & Susan cruising in the Ochotok Sea

Tuesday 28th June 1849.
 Variation 3. E. These 24 hours commenced with fresh winds from the S.W. heading S.E. under short sail employed steering at between north and west. At 10th hour saw several ships whaling and sailing south the S.W. of Sumner's at 8 P.M. began to belt. Middle hours fresh winds from the westward and clear fair and weather. Latter hours fresh winds and clear saw 8 or 10 ships whaling and sailing saw whales and not far a plenty of sea.
 Lat Obs 57.34 North Long 151.36 East.

Wednesday 29th June 1849.
 Variation 4. E. These 24 hours commenced with fresh winds from the westward and clear pleasant weather employed sailing and setting shoals. saw a plenty of whales and not far saw 18 ships the most of them sailing and lying by whales a plenty of sea in sight. Middle hours light winds and variable at daylight saw a plenty of whales and clear. Latter hours pleasant employed steering between north and west.
 Lat Obs 57.33 North Long 151.33 East.

Thursday 30th June 1849.
 Variation 4. E. These 24 hours commenced with light winds from the S.W. heading S.E. saw a whale lower than at going. At 6 P.M. began with the S.W. Middle hours fresh winds and clear. Latter hours fresh winds from the S.W. and to the North.
 Lat Obs 57.39 North Long 152.43 East.

Friday 1st July 1849.
 Variation 5. E. These 24 hours commenced with fresh winds from the S.W. and off S.E. saw 30 ships 4 of them cutting and all but one sailing. At 9 P.M. of 10 ships of 100 tons each employed sailing and sailing up shoals. Middle hours light winds and pleasant. Latter hours pleasant weather saw a plenty of light whales but struck and lost and line employed sailing and setting shoals.
 Lat Obs 57.11 North Long 152.56 East.

Saturday 2nd July 1849.
 Variation 5. E. These 24 hours commenced with pleasant weather wind S.E. heading S.W. employed steering at down forward, between decks at 4 P.M. were secured out of rubber and 12 ships carried whole topsails. Middle hours light winds. Latter hours thick fog stood 30 miles of 100 tons each employed sailing.
 Lat Obs 57.40 North Long 151.40 East.

Sunday 3rd July 1849.
 Variation 4. E. These 24 hours commenced with fresh winds from S.E. and thick fog hauled about all hands employed cleaning and stowing and at 6 P.M. the fog cleared off. Ined full and stood to the southward wind S.E. Middle hours light winds and passing clouds. Latter hours fresh pleasant weather stood 11 ships of 100 tons each saw 1 whale lower than to the S.W.
 Lat Obs 56.24 North Long 151.09 East.

Monday 4th July 1849.
 Variation 4. E. These 24 hours commenced with fine pleasant weather wind S.E. heading by the wind S.W. with all sail employed cleaning and stowing and below at 8 P.M. headed topgallant sails and flying jib heading S.W. wind S.E. Middle hours light winds at daylight made all sail saw whales lower than at and going quickly. Latter hours fine pleasant weather small and clear.
 Lat Obs 55.42 North Long 150.09 East.

Tuesday 5th July 1849.
 Variation 3. E. These 24 hours commenced with fine pleasant weather to wind from the eastward heading S.E. employed and shoals at 2 P.M. kept off S.W. saw 1 sail. Middle hours light winds. Latter hours the same and variable employed sailing up shoals and various other jobs of ships duty spoke the Henry Monckton & Co. of New Bedford 11 months and 500 lbs bound to the Northward.
 Lat Obs 55.08 North Long 149.43 East.

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Wednesday 6th July 1849.
 Variation 3. E. These 24 hours commenced with fine pleasant weather the wind from the Northward heading to the westward light air employed setting up shoals saw the W. 16 whaling and Middle hours fine pleasant weather and light winds sailed to the S.W. at daylight made sail saw the 16 cutting at latter hours fresh winds and clear sailed to the North the wind W.
 Lat Obs 56.22 North Long 148.40 East.

Thursday 7th July 1849.
 Variation 3. E. These 24 hours commenced with pleasant weather the wind strong from W. heading by the wind to the Northward at 6 P.M. headed flying jib and Main topgallant sail at 7 P.M. topgallant sails blowing strong at 9 P.M. to the north sailing heading N.W. by N. Middle hours strong gales and fog at 6 P.M. made sail. Latter hours strong gales steering E.
 Lat Obs 57.13 North Long 149.12 East.

Friday 8th July 1849.
 Variation 3. E. These 24 hours commenced with strong gales from the W. steering east with all sail employed and small jobs at 9 P.M. headed topgallant sails and flying jib the wind light from W. Middle hours light winds from the southward. Latter hours light winds and passing clouds saw 4 ships and of them sailing spoke the Superior & Co. of New Bedford.
 Lat Obs 57.20 North Long 151.16 East.

Saturday 9th July 1849.
 Variation 3. E. These 24 hours commenced with fresh winds from the Southward heading S.E. at 2 P.M. kept off N.W. spoke the Minerva & Co. of New Bedford wanting 60 lbs to fill saw 7 ships & sailing at 9 P.M. headed topgallant sails and flying jib light winds and pleasant. Middle hours light air lay about at daylight made all sail and run North. Latter hours light winds from East hauled to S.E.
 Lat Obs 58.00 North Long 151.13 East.

Sunday 10th July 1849.
 Variation 3. E. These 24 hours commenced with light winds from E. and hauling Southward spoke the Ontario & Co. of Sag Harbor 1200 lbs at 5.30 P.M. sailed to the S.W. wind S.E. light and clear at 8 P.M. sailed to the S.W. headed topgallant sails and flying jib. Middle hours light winds and passing clouds at 3.30 P.M. made all sail. Latter hours strong winds & rough.
 Lat Obs 57.09 North Long 151.26 North.

Monday 11th July 1849.
 Variation 3. E. These 24 hours commenced with strong gales from S.E. heading to the S.E. and hauling Southward at 5 P.M. saw 11 whales lower than at and came in board and to the S.W. at 9 P.M. headed topgallant sails blowing strong and rough. Middle hours fresh winds and fog at daylight made all sail saw 3 carcasses. Latter hours fresh winds saw whales lower than at.
 Lat Obs 57.20 North Long 152.50 East.

Tuesday 12th July 1849.
 Variation 4. E. These 24 hours commenced with fresh winds from S.E. and fog heading East and in board and hoisted up frequent signals of fog at 8 P.M. headed topgallant sails and flying jib heading of fog at 8 P.M. headed topgallant sails. Latter hours the same thick fog.
 Lat Obs 57.30 North Long 153.20 East.

Wednesday 13th July 1849.
 Variation 4. E. These 24 hours commenced with light winds from the S.W. steering east under topsails at 2 P.M. and lay about the wind hauled to the S.W. saw 1 whale in the fog blowing. Middle hours light winds and thick fog. Latter hours the same kept off and run to the Eastward saw whales blowing in the fog.
 Lat Obs 57.35 North Long 153.40 East.
