Tuesday June 22nd. light Winds from the S. and thick fog most of the time, at 3 P.M. took a Whale alongside, at 5 commenced cutting at 10 So. finished latter part employed in boiling and stowing down oil 40 obs.

Wednesday June 23rd. light variable winds and foggy most of the time employed in boiling and stowing down oil 40 obs.

Thursday June 24th. light variable winds and fair about 40 Ships in sight and very few Whales Cape St. Thaddeus in sight of Luck when clear bearing S.W. by W. 40 or 50 mi. Dis spoke Ship Canada S.W. bark Harvest of New Bedford. S.W. this season 40 obs
Employed in boiling and stowing oil.

Friday June 25th. light winds from S. to W. and fair employed in boiling and stowing down oil spoke Ship Liverpool of New Bedford & W. this season

Saturday June 26th. Moderate winds and variables with thick fog most of the time. latter part employed in stowing down oil 40 obs. Lat. by Acc. 63-30 S. Whales

Sunday June 27th. Strong Winds from the S. and thick weather most of the time Steering on Diff. tacks by the wind plenty of Ships & no Whales 40 obs.

Monday June 28th. Strong Winds from S. S. E. and Cloudy spoke barks Alice Frayer & W. Canton Packet & W. Martha 6 W. Harvest & W. Ship Alexander 1 W. this season plenty of Ice in a S. W. and S. Easterly line so ends under Short Sail employed in scraping home Lat. by obs. 63-06 S. Long by Chron. 178-20 W.

Tuesday June 29th. Strong Winds from S. to S. S. E. under Short Sail employed in scraping home Lat. by obs. 63-20 S. Land in sight to the S.W. 30-40 mi. Dis.

Wednesday June 30th. Strong Winds from S. to S. S. E. Steering on different courses sighted Cape St. Thaddeus and then to the Eastward as far as the Ice spoke Ship Liverpool and 5 W. and Bk. Columbia of Sag. Harbor 3 Polar W. & 2 light W. latter part employed in breaking out the ice for break for Shooks &c. 40 obs. Land in sight to the Westward

Thursday July 1st. first part Strong Winds from S. S. E. to S. latter part light Winds and Calms employed in setting up Shooks thick weather plenty of Ice in sight 40 obs.

Friday July 2nd. 1st. part light Winds from the Southward and Calms, myself employed in guining of in the boat got 29 Shooks, Middle and latter part fresh breezes spoke Ships, Wm. Bell of Sag Harbor & W. this season, Motezuma 9 W. at 4 am along side of the Ice making in a S. and S. Easterly line thick fog ends the day with small rain 40 obs. employed on Shooks

Saturday July 3rd. 1st. and Middle part fresh breezes from S. E. and thick fog lying aback on Diff. tacks. latter part Winds from S. S. E. Steering on Diff. courses to the Northward picking my way through the Ice several Sail in sight. 40 obs. Lat. by Acc. 63-25 S.

Saturday July 3rd. West long. time 1st. part moderate Winds from E. Steering on Diff. courses to the Northward at 3 P.M. lowered for a Polar W. saw no more of him at 8 P.M. spoke bark Canton Packet 2 W. at 4 am. Double reefed, at 7 more Ship strong winds and Rainy, at 11 So. hove to under a Double reefed Main Topsail, and Spencer, stowing Gales ends the day 40 obs.
