

Baryne Malinda Searr Crossing,

in the North Atlantic 1873

November 23

First part a strong breeze and cloud from the NNE Middle part the same at seven AM hove the ship to under a double reef main topsail heading SE at 14 PM close reefed the main topsail wind increasing with rain this day ends with a heavy gale from the N with rain

Monday November 24

Comes in with a heavy gale from the N with rain ship under a close reef main topsail on the port tack heading SE Middle and later part a heavy gale from the SSW ship heading to SSW Lat 35-28 Lon 29-11

Tuesday November 25

First and middle part going to under a close reef main topsail Wind from the SSW with a heavy sea later part more moderate made sail and steered to SE but Tim backs no observation this day

Wednesday November 26

Thought this day a fresh breeze and ant smoky weather from NNW first part steered to SE later part to NE Lat 36-16 Lon 31-44

Thursday November 27

First part a strong breeze from the W ship heading SE Middle part under short sail heading N later part steering to the NNE all sail set Employed fitting, roaling tables for the boats

Lon 20-31

Friday November 28

Thought this day a strong breeze from the W ship heading to SNE carrying all sail

Lat 35-43
Lon 17-40

Saturday November 29

First part a strong breeze from the W Middle from the W later part a light breeze and a heavy sea from the S ship roaling badly steering to the SSE last Tim backs and some head

Lat 36-17
Lon 15-18

Sunday November 30

Thought this day a light breeze from the W with a heavy sea ship heading to SSE Lat 36-39 Lon 14-17

Monday December 1

Comes in with a light breeze from the W ship heading SE at 10 AM part four AM rose White Whales going quick to windward coarced two boats and chased out did not go fast at dark took in sail at daylight made sail and steered to SE
