

Thursday Sept the 21<sup>st</sup> the 1847

the first part moderate winds from S.W. and suggest steering E by S the watch employed in bracing out water the middle rainy took in the main topgallant sail latter the same so ends

Friday Sept the 22<sup>nd</sup> the 1847

the first part strong winds from S.W. steering E by S thick and rainy at 10<sup>am</sup> tided to the wind to southward took in the foretop sail and last noon fed the main middle moderate winds from S.W. & made sail stand E by S at 6<sup>am</sup> dited a school of sperm whales 14/3/13 ~~the two whales~~ and the starboard boat went alongside of two or three and missed but got one and 1 boat one at 11<sup>30</sup> am took the whales along side three men of duty one and two were so ends Lat by 39° 54' N Long 31° 26'

Saturday Sept the 23<sup>rd</sup> the 1847

the first part light winds from N.W. heading E.S.E. all hands employed in cutting the whales at 10<sup>am</sup> finished cutting and went to clearing the heads at sunset finished and got supper and set the watch commenced boiling the middle and latter the same so ends this day

Sunday Sept the 24<sup>th</sup> the 1847

the first part a moderate wind from S.W. heading E the watch employed in boiling at 10<sup>am</sup> finished middle and latter a fresh breeze from S.E. heading E.N.E. so ends this day Lat by 39° 30' N Long by 31° 54'

Monday Sept the 25<sup>th</sup> the 1847

the first part strong winds from S.E. and strong heading to the Eastward spoke the ship steering S.W. at 8<sup>am</sup> tided the island of Flores having E.S.E. at 9 tacked the rest of the on different tacks latter under the lee of the land a boat boarded us 14/3/13 ~~the two whales~~ so ends this day

Tuesday Sept the 26<sup>th</sup> the 1847

the first part strong winds from S.E. heading to the S.W. under double reef topgallant saw several sails the middle strong winds from S.E. heading S at 11<sup>am</sup> wore ship at 4<sup>am</sup> wore ship latter the same on different tacks saw several sails so ends

Wednesday Sept the 27<sup>th</sup> the 1847

the first part moderate winds from E at 10<sup>am</sup> the Capt went on shore with a boat crew Calving Manchester deserted at sunset the Capt returned through the night of and on at 8<sup>am</sup> the Capt went on shore John James deserted took on board one boat load of Potatoes at 12<sup>am</sup> the Capt came on board so ends one ship and a bark recruiting

Thursday Sept the 28<sup>th</sup> the 1847

the first part light winds from N.W. and varying on different tacks at 8<sup>am</sup> the Capt went on shore and sent a load of onions off got 14 barrels of potatoes and 12 lbs of onions sold two barrels of black fish at 5<sup>pm</sup> the Capt returned through the night strong winds off and on the land at daylight Capt off for St. Louis at 8<sup>am</sup> the Capt went on shore later strong winds S.W. discharged William Porter sick and shipped three green Portagues so ends this day

Friday Sept the 29<sup>th</sup> the 1847

the first part strong winds from S.W. lying off and on the Capt and boat crew on shore at 10<sup>am</sup> sent on board a boat load of wood at sunset the Capt returned on board steered S.E. 2<sup>nd</sup> by compass middle the same at 10<sup>am</sup> saw 3 sails latter moderate winds saw three sails so ends
