

Saturday, January the 9th 1848
the first part fine trades
from NE on different tacks
saw one sail at sunset took
in sail the middle and
latter the same at daylight
made sail stood in for the
chest at 10⁰⁰ AM headed off
shore so ends this day

Sunday, January the 10th 1848
the first fresh trades stand in
in for the chest at 2 AM
came to anchor the ship
cooper very sick the middle
and latter the same the ship
cooper very low so ends this day

Monday, January the 11th 1848
the first part strong trades
lying to anchor at 9 AM Henry
Berry died through the night
the same at sunrise commenced
makin the coffin at 8 AM took
the corps on shore and buried it
at 10³⁰ AM came on board and
commenced cleansing the cabin and
forecastle so ends this day

Tuesday, January the 12th the 1848
the first part strong trades
all hands impleid in washing
through the night wind the
same at daylight got under
way headed to the southward
so ends this day

Wednesday, January the 13th the 1848
the first part fresh trades on
different tacks at sunset took
in sail middle the same at
daylight made sail steard to
the westward saw several sail
impleid in setting up rigging
so ends this day

Thursday, January the 14th the 1848
the first part moderate trades
steering west saw several sails
at sunset took in sail through on
different tacks at daylight made sail
the wind light steard to the NW
on bent the foresail to mend so ends

Friday, January the 15th the 1848
the first light trades and
calm steering NW at 1 PM
bent the foresail saw hump
backs heard and chased but could
not get fast came on board one
whaleman in sight at sunset
took in sail and luffed to the
southward at daylight saw the
Island of Manas run down the south
side at 10 AM went in with a
boat to fish so ends this day

Saturday, January the 15th the 1848
the first moderate trades at
2 PM the boat came on board
stood to the southward saw
two sails at sunset took in sail
the middle calm at daylight made
sail at 4 PM took a moderate breeze
from the W heading E N E two sails
in sight so ends this day

Sunday, January the 16th the 1848
the first part light winds and
veering steering different courses at
sunset to in sail middle the same
latter strong winds from N on different
tacks saw three sails one whaler saw
humpbacks so ends in dooner passage

Monday, January the 17th the 1848
the first part strong winds from
the W on different tacks middle the
same at daylight made sail better
strong winds from NW and squally
on different tacks four sails in
sight so ends this day
