

Thursday February the 17th the 1848
the first part light winds all round
the compass at 5 PM took a squall of
wind and rain from the N took in the
fore topsail and lost reefed the main
headed to the Westward at 8 PM the
wind hauled to the E and cleared up
the middle on different tacks at
daylight made all sail heading to the
Southward latter nearly calm
so ends this day in same bay.

Friday February the 18th the 1848
the first part light winds from S
steering S by the bark in sight at
sunset took in sail the white cleps
laying N by 15 miles the middle
the same on different tacks at
daylight made all sail heading
to the N latter to the watches
main spinnaker so ends this day.

Saturday February the 19th the 1848
the first part light winds from
the Eastward heading to the N
sent down the main topsail to
mend at 6 PM sent it up and
bent it and shortened sail the
white cleps laring N by 12
miles the bark in sight the middle
the same latter a fine breeze from the
E at day light made sail heading to
the Southward at 7 PM tacked the
bark in sight at 9 AM sent off
to the N so ends same bay.

Sunday February the 20th the 1848
the first light winds from the E
steering to the Westward at 2 PM
calm at sunset took in the gill
and mainsail the cleps laring N
dis 5 miles at 8 PM took a breeze from
N E headed to the S S E middle wind
the same on different tacks at daylight
made all sail steered to the N latter
so saw grampuses so ends in same bay.

Monday February the 21st the 1848
the first part light winds from E S E
steering W saw a breach ran for it
did not see it more at 4 PM fished
to the wind to the S at 5 PM ran
latter to the tacked ship took in
sail the middle the same on
different tacks at daylight made
all sail heading to the N by
the wind at 8 PM tacked ship
broad set in strong took in main
topgallant sail at 12 O'clock tacked
and doubled reefed the topsails
so ends this day in same bay.

Tuesday February the 22nd the 1848
the first part strong winds from
Eastward heading to the Southward
at 2 PM tacked and stood in to
Bottomless Cove took in the courses
and hauled a bark the on different
tacks at daylight made same sail
heading to the S at 7 AM tacked
latter moderate made all sail
the wind baffin run down for the
cleps so ends this day in same bay.

Wednesday February the 23rd the 1848
the first part light wind all
round the compass heading different
ways at sunset took strong trades
took in sail celebrated Washington's
birth day with nine guns the
middle a fresh breeze on different
tacks at daylight made sail on
different tacks light wind and
baffin so ends in same bay.

Thursday February the 24th the 1848
the first part a fresh breeze from
E S E on different tacks at 5 PM spoke
the bark Rhine Francis 720 bbls of
oil the same latter 4000 down
for the cleps the two barks in sight
and the schooner Edwin so ends
in same bay.
