the first part strong winds
from the N.E. heading E.S.E. saw
the West end of St. Domingo
at sunset ~~the~~ the Isle of
Navarra bore E.S.E. at 8 PM wore
ship middle the same at 9 AM
wore at daylight turned one
reef out of the topsails and set
gill mainsail and trysail at 10 AM
at 1 PM turned out the other reefs
at 1 PM tacked so ends this day.

Tuesday March the 28th the 1848
the first part a fresh breeze from
E.N.E. heading N.W. did nothing at
sunset took one reef in each
top sail middle the same on different
tacks at daylight turned the reef
int. heading S.E. at 6 AM tacked
ed. at 9 AM tacked again so ends
Cuba in sight

Wednesday March the 29th the 1848
the first part strong winds
from E.S.E. heading N.E. at 4 PM
tacked saw one reef at 8 PM
took in main topgalantail and
and put one reef in each top sail
middle the same at daylight
saw the N.W. part of St. Domingo
dis 4.5 miles latter on different
tacks saw 3 sails in sight so ends

Thursday March the 30th the 1848
the first part strong winds from
N.W. heading E at sunset shortened
sail and wore ship the middle on
different tacks at daylight made
sail the from the N.E. heading to the
Eastward latter the same watches
employed in bracing for Broad and
water saw several sails so ends

Friday March the 31st the 1848
the first part a fresh breeze from N.E.
to N.W. on different tacks at sunset short-
ned sail heading N.W. by N. the N.W. point
of Gonave Isle bearing N.W. E dis 12 miles
the middle wind the same at 2 AM
tacked at daylight moderate made all
sail heading E by the wind latter
the same at 8 AM tacked ship so ends

Saturday April the 1st the 1848
the first part moderate winds from
the Northward heading to the Eastward
at 6 PM tacked saw grasshoppers at sunset
took in sail for the night had a fresh
breeze through the night the same on
different tacks at daylight made sail head-
ing to the E.S.E. by the wind at 8 AM
3 PM steered W at 11 AM heeled to the
wind to the North set up the main
stay saw grasshoppers so ends this day.

Sunday April the 2nd the 1848
the first part of the 24 hours begins
with light winds winds from the N.E.
and veering with the lubber tacks
aloud at 2 PM tacked up a stick
of mahogany 10 ft long and 18 inch
square at 5:30 PM took a strong
breeze heading E.S.E. took in the main
topgalantail at sunset shortened
sail and wore ship Cape Nichelle
mole bearing N by W dis 15 miles
the middle the same at daylight set
the mainsail heading N.W. with a
strong winds from N.E. at 9 AM wore
ship so ends off Nicolo Mole

Monday March April the 3rd 1848
the first part strong winds from N.E.
heading E.S.E. saw a schooner close in
to the land at 4 PM steered S at sunset
took in the fore top sail and heeled to the wind
N.W. the Cape bearing N dis 20 miles the mid-
dle the same latter at 9 AM steered S by E
I set the fore top sail doubled reefed saw
two sails so ends crossing off St. Domingo
