

Thursday June the 28th the 1848 -
the first part strong winds from
S^W with squalls of rain started a fire
boiled one pot and had to coal down
at 6 AM wore ship middle squall
at 11 AM had a heavy squall of wind
and rain chased up the main topsail
at 1 PM lited up the wind from S^W
heading S^W started the works at 3 PM
wore ship at 4 AM the wind lited to
S^W with light rain went this day
Lat by Obs 32° 03' N Lon by the 49° 01'

Friday June the 30th the 1848
the first part light winds from S^W
heading to N^W with light squalls
of rain at 7 PM finished boiling the
buddy the weather so rainy did not
start the head set the watch three
of the night the wind from the N^W at
10 PM wore ship at daylight made
sail and started the works latter the
wind from N^W heading N^W implied
in boiling saw two sails so ends
Lat by Obs 32° 03' N Lon by the 49° 45'

Saturday July the 1st the 1848
the first part moderate winds from
N^W heading N^W at 3 PM finished
boiling and washed off at sunset lited
in sail a ship passed to the windward
the middle the same at daylight
made sail at 6 AM set a school
of sperm whales at 7 AM and
sawed could not get past so ends
Lat by Obs 31° 45' N Lon by the 50° 00'

Sunday July the 2nd the 1848
the first part a fresh breeze from
N^W off chasing whales carried away
my boats must and thair at 3 PM
came on board at 3 the Capt. board
but did not succeed to get past at 3
came on board at sunset took in sail
heading N^W the middle wind the same
at daylight set double reef topsails on ship
ent. lited so ends Lat by the 32° 07' N Lon by the 49° 02'

Monday July the 3rd the 1848
the first part strong winds from
N^W heading N^W at 3 PM lited to the
wind to the N^W at 6 PM
sited preaches off the sea quarter sun
for them at 4 the whales came up close
along side board but could not get on
at dark came on board took in sail
headed to the N^W through the night the
same at daylight set double reef topsails
commenced brain gut to the down oil
heading N^W so ends this day
Lat by Obs 31° 54' N Lon by the 49° 18'

Tuesday July the 4th the 1848
the first part strong winds from N^W
heading to the N^W implied in stowing
off the hyle at 3 PM saw breaches
sun for them did not see them more
finished stowing and washed off at
sunset took in sail through the night
moderate at daylight made all sail
with a light breeze from N^W heading N^W
at 6 AM wore ship at 8 PM saw a sperm
whales board and chased by the time we
got in three quarters of a mile off
them they perceived us could not get
ny them latter calm at 11 PM saw came
on board so ends this day
Lat by Obs 32° 03' N Lon by the 49° 05'

Wednesday July the 5th the 1848
the first part calm off chasing the
whales chased until 5:30 PM came on
board had a light breeze from N^W
heading N^W at sunset took in sail through
the night wind veering at 11 PM wore
ship headed to the N^W the southward
at daylight catch all hands went on
deck and sited whales close aboard board
to the leeward wore ship got breakfast
wore ship and board starboard and aboard
boats Mr. Macmillan went with the Capt
struck and killed two and the barge
yeamans boats took two more at
1 PM took the whales along side and went
to cutting so ends Lat by the 31° 49'
