

Saturday, July the 22th the 1848
the first part strong winds from
W. N. W. steering E. by compass at sun
set fold gill and mainsail and
fore topgallant sail through the
night the same latter strong
gales and rugged took in to a doubled
main topsail and foresail steard
the same so ends this day
Lat by Obs 37° 22' N Lon by the 41° 46'

Sunday, July the 23th the 1848
the first part strong winds from
W. N. W. rugged from W. N. W. steering
E. by compass through the night the same
at 5 AM set mainsail latter strong
winds and squally saw three
sails heading Eastward so ends this day
Lat by Obs 37° 40' N Lon by the 38° 50'

Monday, June the 24th the 1848
the first part strong gales from W. N. W.
with squalls of rain steering E. by compass
at 4:55 PM took in to a close reef main
topsail and fore sail and fufled E by compass
at 9 PM took on foresail and luffed
to the wind latter part of the night
very rainy caught three cask of water
at daylight the same at 11 AM lited
up sited tag sails in steard E wind
W. N. W. ends this day
Lat by Obs 37° 40' N Lon by the 36° 55'

Tuesday, July the 25th the 1848
the first part moderate winds from
W. and thick cloudy weather steering E.
by compass at 9 PM cleared up made
off drawing sail steard E by compass latter
the same so ends this day
Lat by Obs 37° 00' N Lon by the 34° 30'

Wednesday, July the 26th the 1848
the first part strong winds from
W. N. W. steering E. by compass at 6 AM thick rainy
took in sail to a close reef topsail and
luffed to the wind to the south and west
through the night thick wind from W. N. W.
and veering heading W. N. W. at 4 AM wore
ship and made sail latter moderate
wind E. by compass heading E. by compass in true
in out and fitting cask for water so ends
Lat by Obs 37° 00' N Lon by the 33° 16'

Thursday, July the 27th the 1848
the first part light winds from E. by compass
heading E. by compass finished the cask and stowed
them away sited a sail through the
night moderate winds from W. steering
E. by compass and cloudy at 4 AM sited the
sails off floras bearing W. by compass 40 miles
hauld up for it latter nearly calm
sited one sail so ends this day

Friday, July the 28th the 1848
the first part light winds from W. N. W.
and calm at 4 PM took a light
bree from W. N. W. steering E. by compass at
sunset the ship the Point of the Cape E. by compass
dis 25 miles the middle thick cloudy
weather steering E. by compass at 2:30 AM
luffed of shore and hauld aback at day
thick and rainy wore ship steard in
for the land at 8 AM a boat came
off and hauld us and told us to we could
not land put off for St. Croix at 11:30
AM calm lost to the rocks had to be off
so ends this day being the brig

Saturday, July the 29th the 1848
the first part being the brig at 1:05 PM
came along side took a breeze from W. N. W.
on different tack through the night off
and on at 7 AM the left and Mrs. Magan
went on shore with a boat crew took on board
19 barrels of Potatoes and 10 barrels of onions
sold 4 bbls of humpback oil so ends this day
