

Sunday July the 30th the 1848
the first part light winds from the
westward off and on to St Croix
took three lunches of water at 4pm
the boat came off with a load of
wood through the night made
rate off and on at 8pm the
starboard watch went on shore on
liberty at 10am a launch came off
after cash for water let them have
24 lbs sold a stick of mahogany
for \$15 so ends this day

Monday July the 31st the 1848
the first part moderate winds from
the westward off and on to St Croix
at 10:30pm the water came off
took it on board and fished it
on deck at 10:50pm the watch came
off and the others went on shore
at sunset came off headed to
the southward through the
night the same at daylight
commenced stowing down water
at 6am took it latter the same
so ends this day

Tuesday August the 1st the 1848
the first part light winds from the
westward heading to the northward
at 4:30pm the capt went on
shore to Langes to ship men at sun
set came off with four traps in hands
headed to the south at 12pm were
ship at daylight made sail and
headed in for the town at 6am went
on shore took on shore one man and
brought off two gun down for St
Croix to ship the men before the
caneel shipped five the capt asked the
look to go a shore and ship but the
would not at 12 o'clock the capt
came off headed to the south so ends

Wednesday August the 2nd the 1848
the first part a fresh breeze from W
heading to the SSW saw a sail and
grampuses at sunset took in sail through
the night the same at daylight
made sail latter moderate winds
from WNW heading W saw plenty of
grampuses the watches employed in rigging
up the old fore topsail and cut off the
foot of the fore topmast staysail and
roped it in again and bent it so ends
Lat by Obs 38° 40' N Lon by the 38° 40'

Thursday August the 3rd the 1848
the first part light winds from the
NW heading W saw two sails at sun
set shortened sail through the night
light winds from E steering W at daylight
made all sail latter the same sent in
the gib and repaired it so ends this day
Lat by Obs 37° 50' N Lon by the 37° 55' W

Friday August the 4th the 1848
the first part light winds from the
Eastward steering WSW at sunset
furlled the gib and main sail through
the night nearly calm latter the same
four sails in sight heading Eastward
employed in furling block straps and foot
ropes to the fore topsails yard so ends this day
Lat by Obs 27° 50' N Lon by the 32° 00' W

Saturday August the 5th the 1848
the first part light winds from WSW
heading WSW saw grampuses and porpoises
at sunset shortened sail through the
night the same at 10am made all sail
at daylight saw two sails latter moderate
to broke out the new main topsail and
shortened it on the foot so ends this day
Lat by Obs 36° 40' N Lon by the 32° 55' W
