employed in fitting the boat at 11 tacked to the SE the day ends
fine weather set in by 34.15 at long in by chronometer 23.30 West

ship to the east (not) saw the ship off our weather bear tacked ship
again to the SE watch employed in ships duty various kinds of work
the day ends the same set in by 34.55 at long in by chron 22.17 West

92 Remarks on Thursday September 6th 1849
these 24 hours begins with moderate breeze from E & smooth weather
staring by the wind to the SE watch employed in ships duty making
holopin matts & a net to put onions in at sun down shortened sail
& wore ship to the east by middle & latter part of the day light winds
from E & fine weather at 1 PM the strong ship passed to westward
of us boiling at 5 AM made all sail staring by the wind saw
a plenty of porpoises watch employed in ships duty at 10 AM tacked
ship to the eastward so ends this day fine weather
Set in by 33.52 at long in by chronometer 22.21 West

at 3 PM saw a small
small longish fish
saw a plenty of porpoises

93 Remarks on Friday September 7th 1849
these 24 hours begins with light winds from E & fine
pleasant weather staring to the SE by the wind watch employed in
ships duty working making a line tub & onion net owing to faint
in the main tacked at sun down shortened sail nearly calm the wind
bowed round to the westward at 5 AM made all sail fine breeze from
West to the watch employed in working & mending there close
at 8 past 11 took in by 34.8 & left to sail the day ends with fresh
breeze & cloudy weather
Set in by 34.13 at long in by chronometer 22.10 West

saw a plenty of porpoises

94 Remarks on Saturday September 8th 1849
these 24 hours begins with fresh breeze from the westward & cloudy weather
& some small rain & clear & spells staring by the wind huddling from east
watch employed in working there close at 1 PM took in main
top gallant sail at sun down shortened sail middle & latter part of the day
light winds & fine weather at 3 PM wore ship to the SE at 8 made
sail & broke out the hole after cold fish lions coffee sugar & molasses
saw a plenty of porpoises & the day ends fine weather tacked ship to the east
Set in by 34.13 at long in by chronometer 22.02 West

& cloudy & misty by spells latter part of the day fine breeze & fine
weather made all sail staring by the wind huddling from E to the east
the day ends the same set in by 34.45 at long in by chron 22.15 West

at 9 AM cleared of fine weather watch employed in ships duty fitting
the house overhead to hatch rain water & picking over beans the day
ends fine weather nothing in sight was steam SE
