these 24 hours begins with squally & rainy weather at 1 PM till 4 PM
reining faster ship & broadened SE with a moderate breeze from ESE
& raining by spells at sun down shortened sail at 5 PM made sail &
went ship to the SE at 6 PM began to rain & thick weather took
sail & stood back over the day ends with thick weather & a heavy
of rain fell in 4 PM 18.50 South long in 4 PM 35.10 West

102 Remarks on Wednesday December 5th 1849
these 24 hours begins with moderate breeze from the ESE & thick
reining weather at 1 PM was ship to the south standing back over
at 3 PM saw one humpback whale at 4 PM 5 PM shortened
sail at 7 PM held up raining at 1 PM night an unknown large
sperm whale came to collar latter part of the day light winds &
fine weather at 8 PM made all sail at 8 PM tucked ship to the
North saw 3 whales at 9 PM tucked ship to the SE watch
empty in ships duty stripping down stuff thereby fine weather
fell in 4 PM 17.17 South long in 4 PM 35.10 West

103 Remarks on Thursday December 6th 1849
these 24 hours begins with light winds from ESE & fine weather
under all sail steering by the wind to the SE one whale big off our
weather quarter steering the same at 2 PM tucked ship to the SE
at 5 PM squally shortened sail for the night made latter part
of the day fine weather at 12 PM night was ship to the SE at
8 PM made sail & stood on but up new main rig at 9 PM
at 9 PM kept Jim back & manual panels on deck in three
watch below cleaning iron work for gunnelling & fighting
at 4 PM 11 PM saw a strong breeze off our lee beam steering to the
the day ends light winds from ESE & fine weather
fell in 4 PM 18.50 South long in 4 PM 35.45 West

104 Remarks on Friday December 7th 1849
these 24 hours begins with light winds from ESE & fine pleasant
weather under all sail steering by the wind to the SE one whale
big off our lee beam steering the same Jim back & manual
panels cleaning the rust of the chains to paint at sun down
shortened sail & went ship to the SE latter part of the day fine
breeze from ESE & fine weather at 5 PM made all sail at 8
tucked ship to the North saw one whale big off our lee beam steering
by the wind to the SE watch empty in ships duty cleaning off the
iron work & painting it the day ends fine weather tucked ship to
the SE fell in 4 PM 18.52 South long in 4 PM 37.09 West

105 Remarks on Saturday December 8th 1849
these 24 hours begins with a fine breeze from ESE & fine weather
under all sail steering by the wind to the SE watch empty in
cleaning the rust of the iron work & painting it black one strong
sail in sight to the westward of us at sun down shortened sail
middle & latter part of the day light winds from ESE at 6 PM
made all sail at 7 PM 8 PM stood on South at 9 PM saw a school
of whales a head going quick to the SE & saw a whale vessel
to leeward whaling ship galley the whales at 10 PM saw a strong breeze
to leeward kept off for the one to the leeward of her at midnight were
lowered 3 boats for the whales 1 boat off the weather bow 3 miles off
seems this day fine weather
fell in 4 PM 17.20 South long in 4 PM 35.10 West

106 Remarks on Sunday December 9th 1849
these 24 hours begins with light winds from ESE & fine weather boats
off chasing whales the whale was galley & went off to leeward at
4 PM boats came on board & stood by the wind to the SE light
air of wind one merchant vessel to the westward steering 5 PM
at 6 PM went to the boat on board of the ship acquainted of crew got
60 days out bound to California got some papers at sun down
shortened sail at 8 PM at 8 PM a light breeze spring up from them
at 8 PM made all sail & tucked ship to the SE at 9 PM saw a whale
man off our weather bow over tucked ship to the Eastward squally round
to the SE at 10 PM the day ends light winds Long in 4 PM 35.25
fell in 4 PM 17.27 South long in 4 PM 35.10 West

107 Remarks on Monday December 10th 1849
these 24 hours begins with light winds from the SE & some squalls
hanging round one sail of our weather quarter at 1 PM saw 6 whales
6 miles off our weather beam at 3 PM the wind backed up from SE &
began to be squally at 4 PM began to rain at 7 PM held up raining much
part squally by spells at 8 PM turned the rudders out main top sail & stood
on 10 PM saw 4 merchant ships & barques steering to the SE at 9 PM
stood on with thick rainy weather the wind from SE at 11 PM the wind
battered to the SE the day ends with thick rainy weather
fell in 4 PM 17.5 South long in 4 PM 35.20 West

108 Remarks on Tuesday December 11th 1849
these 24 hours begins with light winds from the SE & thick rainy weather
steering by the wind to the SE under short sail at 3 PM saw a humpback
one big an arrow sailing at 4 PM was ship to the SE at 4 PM 5 PM shortened
sail middle part rainy by spells at 5 PM was ship to the SE & made all
sail a man off our weather bow at 5 PM began to rain thick in sail &
stood short watches the day ends with light breeze & variable & thick &
raining fell in 4 PM 17.00 South long in 4 PM 35.35 West
