

218 Remarks on Tuesday January 12th 1850
there 24 hours begins with a fine breeze from ESE & fine weather under
all sail steering by the wind to the SE & watch employed in ship's duty
at 10 AM the foremast & main topmasts stay at sun down station
sail latter part of the day fresh breeze from ESE & passing clouds
at 5 PM made sail at 5 PM took ship to the SE & saw one whale
big off our weather quarter about 10 miles off the ship at 4 PM saw a whale
in the water to windward steering off to the SE & watch employed on
board in ship's duty & got a distance between the sun & moon at
midnight took ship to the SE so ended this day
Lat in 4 deg 17.14 South long in 4 chronometer 35.33 west

217 Remarks on Wednesday January 9th 1850
there 24 hours begins with fine breeze from East & fine weather steering
to the SE by the wind watch employed about the rigging at 5 PM a
merchant barque sailed to the windward steering by the wind to the SE
at sun down station sail at 10 PM was ship to the SE
latter part of the day fresh breeze & squally weather by shifts at 5 PM
made sail saw one big to windward at 11 PM on an English
steamer sailed us steering to the SE with a cloud of sail out & steam
on the day ends fresh breeze & squally weather & passing clouds & rain
Lat in 4 deg 17.22 South long in 4 chronometer 35.35 west

216 Remarks on Thursday January 10th 1850
there 24 hours begins with fresh breeze from ESE & passing squalls of rain
steering by the wind to the SE at sun down station sail & was ship to
the SE & mid. & latter part of the day squally by shifts at 4 PM was
ship to the SE at 5 PM made sail at 5 PM saw the 2 Franklin to windward
steering to the SE at midnoon took ship to the SE so ended this day
Lat in 4 deg 18.51 South long in 4 chronometer 35.54 west

219 Remarks on Friday January 11th 1850
there 24 hours begins squally by shifts steering to the SE by the wind
at sun down station sail latter part of the day fresh breeze from ESE
to ESE & passing squalls at 5 PM was ship to the SE & made sail
saw one merchant barque steering to the SE & watch employed in
making signal at midnoon took ship & headed NE fine weather
Lat in 4 deg 18.54 South long in 4 chronometer 35.34 west

220 Remarks on Saturday January 12th 1850
there 24 hours begins with a fine breeze from East & fine weather
steering to the SE by the wind watch employed in making signal at
1 PM at all sail at 3 PM the 2 Franklin spoke us & we went on board
at sun down station sail at 10 PM came on board at 3 PM was ship
to the SE at 5 PM made sail Franklin in sight & saw some passing squalls
at 10 PM Franklin went out sight saw the 2 Franklin to windward the day ends
with fresh breeze Lat in 4 deg 17.07 South long in 4 chronometer 36.27 west

221 Remarks on Sunday January 13th 1850 Lat 18.55 long 36.35 west
there 24 hours begins with a fresh breeze from ESE & passing clouds
& some passing rain squalls steering by the wind to the SE at 4
PM saw several large whales bearing NW by from us & going
SE & at 4 PM lowered the lee landward boat to port to lower the
starboard boat & got fast to a whale & set him to shooting blood
at 7 PM put the whale a long side & shot him & set the watch
& got up the cutting tackle latter part of the day strong breeze & rugged
sea & fair weather at 4 PM put the whale all hands & heaved on
the whale saw several sails at 10 PM saw two whaling barques to leeward
at 4 PM midnoon got the whale head off & body in 20 covers this day
Lat in 4 deg 18.50 South long in 4 chronometer 35.54 west

222 Remarks on Monday January 14th 1850
there 24 hours begins with fine weather & a ruff sea on wind from ESE
& moderating all hands employed in cutting in the head saw the barque
exchange to leeward at 2 PM the barque fired & crew boarded spoke
us & left vessel he sent his boat on board & got some papers bound to
himself after water at 4 PM we got on whale all on board &
landed up decks was ship to the SE at 4 PM set the watch & made
a fire & commenced boiling head fine weather mid. & latter
part of the day light winds & fine weather at 4 PM set
sail & spoke all hands employed in cutting blubber
& boiling & looking out for more the day ends light breeze
Lat in 4 deg 17.17 South long in 4 chronometer 35.51 west

223 Remarks on Tuesday January 15th 1850
there 24 hours begins with light winds from ESE & calm breeze to the
SE by the wind all hands employed in cutting some pieces & boiling
saw one strong sail steering to the SE at 5 PM finished cutting up
the blubber in horse pieces & shot him & set the watch calm mid.
& latter part of the day fine breeze from ESE & fine weather all hands
employed in boiling at 7 PM made all necessary sail saw the
barque exchange to windward at midnoon took ship to the SE & the
Lat in 4 deg 17.53 South long in 4 chronometer 35.30 west

224 Remarks on Wednesday January 16th 1850
there 24 hours begins with light winds from ESE & fine weather
steering by the wind to the SE at all hands employed in boiling
several sails in sight at 5 PM finished boiling & turned up the oil
at sun down station sail latter part of the day fresh breeze at 5 PM
made sail saw one barque to windward at 7 PM the barque
fired & crew boarded spoke us & we went on board a few moments at
10 PM came on board watch employed in fitting up whale gear at
midnoon took ship & headed up SE & SE so ended this day
Lat in 4 deg 18.54 South long in 4 chronometer 36.40 west
