

232 Remarks on Tuesday January 26th 1850
Three 24 hours begins with a fine breeze from ESE & fine weather under all sail steering by the wind to the NW by watch employed in ships duty at 2 PM hauled ship to the Eastward at sun down shot down sail latter part of the day fine breeze & passing clouds at 5 PM was ship to the NW by & made sail saw several seals watch employed in ships duty right up the old file water retaining the molasses each the day ends with a fine breeze nothing in sight
Set in by log 17.07 South long in by chronometer 35.40 west

233 Remarks on Friday January 28th 1850
Three 24 hours begins with a fine breeze from shore & passing clouds steering by the wind to the NW by watch employed in ships duty saw several more boat vessels at sun down shot down sail & were ship to the Eastward latter part of the day fine breeze & mostly weather at 4 PM at 5 PM made sail at 6 PM hauled the main sail & commenced repairing it the day ends with a fine breeze from NW & nothing in sight
Set in by log 17.12 South long in by chronometer 35.38 west

234 Remarks on Saturday January 28th 1850
Three 24 hours begins with a fine breeze from NW & mostly weather steering by the wind to the Eastward watch employed in mending the main sail at 5 PM finished the main sail & bent it to the gear at 6 PM spoke the 2 Franklin & went on board at 10 came back latter part of the day fresh breeze & shells & passing squalls at 4 PM at 5 PM made sail at 7 PM hauled ship to the NW by 2 Franklin & barque Morice & crew hauled in sight & several miscellaneous vessels the day ends 2 Franklin & barque in sight Set in by log 17.09 South long in by chronometer 35.20 west

235 Remarks on Sunday January 27th 1850
Three 24 hours begins with a fine breeze from ESE some squalls hanging round at 4 PM 1 hauled ship to the ESE at 4 PM nearly calm at sun down shot down sail latter part of the day equally & shells at 5 PM at 6 PM made sail the wind from shore saw several seals at 9 PM hauled ship to the NW by the day ends more clear one seal in sight
Set in by log 17.03 South long in by chronometer 35.58 west

236 Remarks on Monday January 28th 1850
Three 24 hours begins with moderate winds from the North & squalls hanging round steering by the wind to the North at sun down shot down sail & were ship to the Eastward nearly calm at 3 PM commenced raining at 4 PM up & cleared off made all sail & steered by the wind heading West the wind from NW by in one seal of our weather quarters steering the same the day ends fair weather
Set in by log 18.59 South long in by chronometer 35.14 west

237 Remarks on Tuesday January 29th 1850
Three 24 hours begins with a fine breeze from NW to NW by & fair weather but some squalls hanging round under all sail steering by the wind to the Westward two sails in sight watch employed in ships duty at sun down was ship to the NW & shot down sail at 9 PM the ship Emma C Jones of New Bedford spoke us east little 3 miles out 3 to 4 miles went on board at 11 came on board equally & rain by shells latter part of the day equally & shells at 4 PM at 5 PM was ship to the NW by & made all sail saw one seal the ship & the barque in sight the day ends fair weather
Set in by log 17.00 South long in by chronometer 35.38 west

238 Remarks on Wednesday January 30th 1850
Three 24 hours begins with a fine breeze from NW to NW by & some passing squalls of rain steering by the wind to the NW by the Emma C Jones to Westward steering the same at 5 PM we spoke the barque barclay of Westport Cape King came on board at sun down shot down sail at 7 PM hauled ship on board & we steering to the NW by the wind latter part of the day fine breeze & passing clouds at 5 PM made sail the Franklin & barclay in sight at 11 we killed a large seal black fish going to the windward the day ends with a fine breeze
Set in by log 17.13 South long in by chronometer 35.40 west

239 Remarks on Thursday January 31st 1850
Three 24 hours begins with a fine breeze from NW & passing clouds steering by the wind to the NW by barclay & Franklin in sight at 4 PM at 5 PM the 2 Franklin spoke us & we run off & spoke the barclay Cape King & right hauled came on board at sun down shot down sail at 10 PM went on board & i & the barclay were ship to the NW by the barclay bound to the island Trinidad latter part of the day fresh breeze & heavy weather & some passing squalls at 5 PM made all sail saw one seal Franklin of our last night steering to the NW by saw one French ship & the exchange watch employed in making wind at midnight reefed topails so ends the day fresh breeze
Set in by log 17.21 South long in by chronometer 35.53 west

240 Remarks on Friday February 1st 1850
Three 24 hours begins with fresh breeze from NW & some passing squalls steering by the wind to the NW by watch employed in making wind at sun down shot down sail & were ship to the NW by middle & latter part of the day fresh breeze & passing clouds at 3 PM was ship to the NW by at 5 PM made sail watch employed in ships duty saw one seal steering to the NW by at midnight hauled ship to the ESE so ends the day nothing in sight
Set in by log 18.44 South long in by chronometer 35.30 west
