Remarks on Tuesday April 16th 1850

these 24 hours begins with light winds from S.W. & fine weather steering to the westward by the wind watch employed in setting up the main topmast backstays at 1 PM were picked up a pitch pine board 37 feet in length at 4 PM saw two strong seals steering to the N.W. & at sun down shot one seal & was ship to the S.W. at 5 PM was ship & made all sail at 7 PM saw a school of large whales bearing N.E. from us & going out was bound for them & got 2 one to the foremast & one to the mainmast both the day ends with light winds from S.W. & fine weather & a smooth sea on board, & lost to the whales  
Lat in 4 deg 30.10 N long in 7 deg 12.00 west

Remarks on Wednesday April 17th 1850

these 24 hours begins with light winds from S.W. & fine smooth & pleasant weather & boats off fore to whales at 2 PM got the whales fluked along side & shot one seal & got dinner & got up eating tools at 3 PM looked on to one whale at 7 got his head off & body in got supper & set the watch shot watches at 1 PM the wind began to blow up & grew rugged at daylight cold all hands & commenced cutting in one whale & saw & fresh bears the day ends the same all hands employed in cutting in whale  
Lat in 4 deg 29.50 N long in 7 deg 12.00 west

Remarks on Thursday April 18th 1850

these 24 hours begins with fresh breeze from S.W. & rugged sea on & cloudy weather & the wind falling to the westward at sun down got the whales all on board & tails down & all ready for boiling at 3 PM set the watch & made a fire & commenced boiling down wine from seal & fair weather at 1 PM the wind began from S.W. & increased to a strong breeze & a rugged sea on latter part of the day fresh breeze & rugged all hands employed in boiling & cutting up blubber, heading to the Eastward under shot seal the day ends fair weather  
Lat in 4 deg 29.29 N long in 7 deg 12.55 west

Remarks on Friday April 19th 1850

these 24 hours begins with fresh breeze from S.W. & rugged sea on & cloudy weather to the Eastward under shot seal all hands employed & boiling had cutting down pieces & taking care of oil at 2 PM it began to blow on & grew ruff & equally took the boats up & lost watch main topmast at 5 PM the wind better & was ship to the S.W. & the sea had sea on & equally by shells at 7 PM it began to moderate & clear up latter part of the day moderate breeze from S.W. & fair weather & the sea falling all hands employed in boiling & cutting down pieces at 11 PM the 3 paraffin lamps at 200 lbs & the stand to the South the day ends fine weather  
Lat in 4 deg 29.39 N long in 7 deg 13.00 west

Remarks on Saturday April 20th 1850

these 24 hours begins with light winds from S.W. & fine weather heading to the N.E. under shot seal main topmast & for seal all hands employed in boiling & cutting down pieces & taking care of oil at 4 PM got the blubber all cut in bare pieces middle part of the day light winds & fine weather latter part fine breeze at 7 PM were ship & made all sail set both topmasts & spunk saw two seals & commenced finishing boiling seal the day ends fine breeze from S.W. & fair weather  
Lat in 4 deg 29.22 N long in 7 deg 12.22 west

Remarks on Sunday April 21st 1850

these 24 hours begins with a fine breeze from S.W. & fair weather steering to the westward all hands employed in burning up the oil & carrying the oil & lashing it up & washed off decks at sun down shot one seal & was ship to the S.W. middle & latter part of the day fine weather at 5 PM were ship to the S.W. & made sail saw several seals at 7 PM i boistered John Miller from the cabin going away to the main hatch with the side of my foot & seeing chaplain told me he would make me pay for it if he was in miller's place i took hold of chaplain & shook him with my hands & he was saving to me & i sent him to the mast head to look out for whales the day ends with light winds & fine weather  
Lat in 4 deg 29.53 N long in 7 deg 12.23 west

Remarks on Monday April 22nd 1850

these 24 hours begins with light winds from S.W. & fine pleasant weather under all sail steering to the west to the S.W. & at 3 PM calm at sun down shot one seal at 4 PM the wind began from the South & the N.E. middle & latter part of the day fine breeze & fine weather at 5 PM made sail at 7 PM took the watch employed in carrying our oil at midnight stand first seal the day ends the day  
Lat in 4 deg 30.13 N long in 7 deg 12.20 west

Remarks on Tuesday April 23rd 1850

these 24 hours begins with a fine breeze from the South & fine weather steering N.W. watch employed in carrying our oil at 3 saw a strong ship steering to the N.W. & at 5 PM finished carrying our oil at sun down shot one seal & was ship to the Eastward middle & latter part of the day fine breeze from S.W. & fine weather at 5 PM were ship to the S.W. & set both & spunk & commenced lashing out the store down our oil saw several seals the day ends fine weather all hands employed in storing down oil  
Lat in 4 deg 29.55 N long in 7 deg 12.00 west
