

347 Remarks on Saturday May 18th 1850
Three 24 hours begins with light winds from the N.E. & fine weather
staring by the wind to the E. & E. watch employed in ships duty making
new jib. pendant & other various kinds of work on board one
schooner in sight at 5 PM calm at sun down took in all sail but
double reef. At 9 PM a light breeze sprung up from the N.E. to
stern & by the wind latter part of the day moderate breeze from
N.W. & fine pleasant weather at 5 or 6 made sail & steered N.E.
several sails in sight were commenced setting up for stay & for
shrouds at midnoon steered East so were this day fine weather
Set in by log 30.22 or long in by chronometer 70.20 west

348 Remarks on Sunday May 19th 1850
Three 24 hours begins with a fine breeze from West by fine pleasant
weather steering East watch employed in setting up main shrouds &
for topmast shrouds saw several strange sails at sun down shorten sail
& stand by the wind to the N.E. middle & latter part of the day light
winds from N.W. & fine weather at 5 PM made sail & steered N.E. & E.
saw two sails the day ends with light winds & fine weather
Set in by log 30.28 or long in by chronometer 69

349 Remarks on Monday May 20th 1850
Three 24 hours begins with light winds from N.E. & fine weather at 1 PM
went to the beach on board of the American surveying schooner. Colborn
bound to the state & sent one letter. Bunker to New York the boat came
on board & we steered East at sun down shorten sail & stand by the wind
to the N.E. middle & latter part lightening & thunder at 5 PM made sail
at 7 equally attended with thunder & sharp lightning & calm by 8 PM
one schooner in sight at 10 the wind backed up from N.E. made sail
at 11 made all sail steered N.E. & E. the day ends with a fine breeze & fair
weather Set in by log 30.34 or long in by chronometer 68.30 west

350 Remarks on Tuesday May 21st 1850
Three 24 hours begins with a fine breeze from N.E. & fine weather
steering N.E. & E. watch employed in ships duty at 2 stand E & E at
6 the wind backed N.E. at sun down shorten sail middle &
latter part of the day moderate breeze from N.E. & fine weather at 5 PM
made all sail at 7 tackled ship to the N.E. several sails in sight
watch employed in ships duty making new ring studding & stay sail
shale at 9 AM we lowered the boat & picked up a cedar for
the day ends fine weather
Set in by log 30.25 or long in by chronometer 68.17 west

351 Remarks on Wednesday May 22nd 1850
Three 24 hours begins with a fine breeze from N.E. & fine
weather under all sail staring by the wind to the N.E. watch employed
in ships duty several strange sails in sight at 1 PM lower after black
fish could not get past is more board at sun down shorten sail &
middle part of the day light winds latter part moderate breeze from
N.E. to N.W. at 5 made sail & steered by the wind to the N.W. & E. tackled
ship to the N.E. watch employed in ships duty about the rigging saw one
sail the day ends light winds & fine weather
Set in by log 29.57 or long in by chronometer 67.45 west

352 Remarks on Thursday May 23rd 1850
Three 24 hours begins with light winds from N.E. & fine weather
staring by the wind to the N.E. watch employed about the rigging
at sun down shorten sail at 12 were ship to the N.W. at 5 PM
made sail at 2 calm on board the speaker & stepped in one sail &
masted the sail the day ends calm weather
Set in by log 29.55 or long in by chronometer 67.44 west

353 Remarks on Friday May 24th 1850
Three 24 hours begins with calm & fine weather watch employed in
binding the speaker at 1 PM a light breeze sprung up from the
N.W. made sail & steered N.E. & E. at 2 calm at sun down shorten
sail middle & latter part calm at 5 PM a light breeze sprung up from
the N.W. & backed round to the N.E. made sail at 8 nearly calm one
schooner in sight on board the main speaker & masted the sail at 8 PM
at 10 on fine weather the day ends with light winds of wind from East
Set in by log 29.50 or long in by chronometer 67.32 west

354 Remarks on Saturday May 25th 1850
Three 24 hours begins with light winds of wind from East staring to the
N.W. by the wind fine pleasant weather watch employed in ships duty
one schooner in sight at 4 PM the wind backed up from N.E. & sun
down shorten sail middle & latter part of the day moderate breeze
from N.E. to N.W. at 5 PM made all sail staring by the wind to
the N.W. at 8 on board for topmast staysail & repaired it saw one
sail at 10 picked up a yellow pine piece 110 feet long took it on
board at 11 finished the sail & left it the day ends fine weather
Set in by log 30.55 or long in by chronometer 67.00 west

355 Remarks on Sunday May 26th 1850
Three 24 hours begins with a fine breeze from N.E. & fine weather staring
by the wind to the N.E. at 8 PM the ship masted capst & electric
of our keel for spoke in 34 months out 1000 lbs whole oil barrel home
came on board & got some paper at sun down shorten sail at 12
were ship to the N.W. & made sail at 2 double reefed the day ends
Set in by log 31.41 or long in by chronometer 66.12 west
