Monday 18th

Commences with strong winds with a heavy sea running from the S.E. heading by the wind S.E. vessel under short sail Middle part blowing a gale latter part still blowing with heavy squalls from S. home to under close reefed foresail one sail in sight so ends

Commences with strong winds and a heavy sea running from the S.E. heading by the wind S.E. crew employed on ship duty At 5 O'clock P.M. spoke the Rosa Baker of Boston and she was boiling had taken two small whales the day before buffed by the wind heading N. Middle and latter parts wind and weather continues the same one sail in sight so ends Lat - Long

Commences with strong winds and a heavy sea running from the S.W. heading S.E. At 1 O'clock P.M. Captain run along side of the Rosa Baker returned in about half a hour it was too rough weather to get off sundown took in sail for the night Middle and latter parts weather more moderate. brig is still in sight so ends this day Lat - Long

Monday 25th

Commences with moderate breeze from the S.W. with rain squalls at half past 12 O'clock saw the Rosa Baker tack and haul up her foresail for us to pass we ran down to her and Captain Tifford came aboard and returned at sundown took in sail for the night Middle part weather about the same latter part more moderate two sails in sight so ends this day Lat - Long

Tuesday 26th

Commences with a strong breeze from the S.W. vessel steering E. by N. crew employed breaking out for flour saw grasshoppers breaching Middle and latter parts light breezes from the S.E. steering E. by N. nothing in sight so ends
