

Remarks on Board Barque

out our mistake set up one side of the main top gallant rigging to lay crew employed on ship's duty. Middle part the same latter part strong breeze from the N. E. W. saw porpoises and cowfish and that is all so ends this day

Sunday 21st

Commences blowing strong from the N. E. W. vessel by the wind under the lee of the Island of Terceira with double reefed topsails and foresail. jib and spanker Middle part wind shifted into the N. E. W. we expect a gale for today the sun crosses the line and the weather looks bad and squally latter part wind and weather the same saw a topsail schooner to windward so ends

Monday 22nd

Commences with a strong breeze from the N. E. W. vessel still lying under the lee of the Island at 1 O'clock P.M. the Captain lowered a boat and went ashore to a small town called Port Payer returned again at 4 O'clock P.M. made but a short stay see nothing he liked better than himself Middle part latter part light winds and calms still creeping on and off the Island saw porpoises nothing more

Tuesday 23rd

Commences with a light breeze from N. E. W. vessel by the wind in the off shore tack crew employed on ship's duty saw grampuses started for Fayal again Middle part quite squally latter part wind shifted into the N. E. W. free from squalls and a moderate breeze so ends this day

Wednesday 24th

Commences with a strong breeze from the N. E. W. ship by the wind bound for Fayal at 3 O'clock passed St. George's head and at 5 O'clock was abreast of the town saw two whale ships laying off and on one discharged oil and sent it ashore Middle part laying off and on at the back side of the Island latter part wind from the N. E. W. and blowing strong so ends

Thursday 25th

Commences with a strong breeze from the N. N. E. vessel by the wind on different tacks beating up into the harbor against a strong tide one whaling schooner and the Mail steamer and a Barkentine lying at anchor in the harbor at 1 O'clock P.M. lowered the waist boat and pulled the Captain ashore returned at sundown and we then stood in shore Middle part light winds at half past 12 O'clock A.M. a boat came from shore brought two Portuguese and smuggled about \$200 worth of Tobacco ashore latter part a moderate breeze from the same quarter at half past 7 O'clock A.M. lowered away the waist boat and went in for the Captain and returned at 12 O'clock A.M. so ends

Friday 26th

Commences with a strong breeze from the N. E. W. squared our yards and bid farewell to Fayal ran down along by Pico and at sundown was abreast of the southern point we are now bound for Teneriffe to get water and to have a look at the Spanish girls crew employed on ship's duty Middle part light winds from the N. E. W. ship steering a course S. E. by E. latter part the same so ends
