

Remarks on Board Barge

Wednesday 11th

Commences today with a light breeze from the N. E. vessel by the wind on the Port tack heading E. S. E. crew employed setting up the head stays and on ships duty Middle and Latter parts light air and calm crew employed setting up the mizen rigging saw nothing but birds and small fish so ends this day

Thursday 12th

Commences today with light winds from different quarters vessel steering N. E. by N. on the Port tack with fine pleasant weather crew employed on various parts of ships duty saw porpoises and nothing more Middle and Latter parts a light breeze from the North saw three sails and a piece of squel so ends this day

Friday 13th

Commences today with a light breeze from the N. E. vessel steering by the wind heading N. E. by E. crew employed on different parts of ships duty some painting the foremast and others scraping the Roostays Middle and Latter parts wind from the N. E. with fine pleasant weather five sails in sight all merchantmen so ends this day

Saturday 14th

Commences today with a light breeze from the N. E. with fine pleasant weather vessel by the wind heading N. E. crew employed on ships duty At 2 O'clock P. M. Captain went on board a German Brigg bound for Liverpool returned again at 5 O'clock P. M. there is 6 sails in sight Middle and Latter parts a strong breeze from the N. E. so ends this day

Sunday 15th

Commences today with a strong breeze from the N. E. vessel by the wind on the Starboard tack heading N. E. W. crew employed on ships duty Middle and Latter parts wind more moderate from the same quarter one sail in sight so ends this day

Monday 16th

Commences today with a moderate breeze from the N. E. with fine pleasant weather vessel by the wind on the Port Tack heading E. S. E. at noon today the Island of Trinidad lay eight miles to windward of us two sails in sight saw a school of porpoises and nothing more so ends this day

Tuesday 17th

Commences today with a light breeze from the N. E. vessel by the wind on different tacks with fine weather crew employed on ships duty saw two sails Middle and Latter parts a moderate breeze from E. S. E. at daylight sighted the Island of Trinidad about 25 miles off we are making short tacks beating to windward for the Island saw nothing so ends this day

Wednesday 18th

Commences today with a strong breeze from the N. E. vessel by the wind on different tacks crew employed on ships duty Captain getting the fishing tackle ready for use intend to go a fishing for one day saw two sails and nothing more Middle and Latter parts wind and weather the same At daylight the Island was about 10 miles off saw one sail so ends this day
