

Sept 26th Continued. At 1. P.M. sighted New
Island west of St. John's. Baring 12.6
dis. 15.3. Left off for the south passage &
came to anchor at 4. P.M. in Tiger
Harbour New Island.

Sept 27th
Sent up main topmast & set up rig.
Strong breeze throughout from S.W.
Luke Johnson & Walter Barkerley landed.

Sept 28th
Strong S.W. winds. Took out the
hold & six days got small light water
& 40 geese. These geese are just splended
very man off duty sick.

Sept 29th
Winds from S.W. to N. barometer
falling. got off 5 sacks potatoes one
one sheep. Got the first gale from
S.W. brought the deer skins put them
in the run in Arens.

Sept 30th
gale from S.W. brought up on the
one sack potatoes & sheep.
Luke Johnson was hurt & thrust
to cut out the left gut on
burn the brig & over the gut out
of Arens and the after twenty apr.

Oct 1st
Still blowing hard from S.W.
dropped second anchor the spray
from the surf coming clear over the
Island shows that the current will
be very heavy sea outside could not
get a boat in there to day, although
quite smooth.

Oct 2nd
Wind backed around to S.W. &
moderate. some went on shore &
got 250 eggs. They are not all called
the Duck. Much species of sea
bird similar to the albatross & lay
a very large egg. Equal in place to
a hen's egg. The prisoners in the
run have bin into a case of canned
Chicken and opened several cans at the
mouth.

Oct 3rd
Blowing a gale from W. to S.W.
with snow and rain.

Oct 4th
gale from W. to S.W. with snow rain.
The heaviest gale we have had, at
7. P.M. gale increasing rapidly and blowing
in squalls with hurricane force ship
with boat anchors down & 605. 10 fath chain
out. wind baffling coming in waves
striking the ship at time & throwing
her on her beam ends. at 11 P.M.
got a terrific squall started both
anchors & grounded the brig upon
the rock called all hands tried to
haul her off but did not succeed
until 5.00. as there is not room
enough to get up a sea in the
harbour, about half tide when strong

Oct 5th
Still blowing heavy. Brig quit. side
at 2. am more moderate. at 4. am
her off wind moderating fast
at day light on looking around
found the gale has bin raised on
the land as well as in the harbour.
Stone walls and pipes lying
flat to the ground. sea pieces
of blue rock and other stuff on
the shore. at noon went on
shore, instant report heaviest
gale they ever experienced. East
several cottages blown into bits
and off hills, in blowing the brig
off broke started shipper & finally
began to swell off to middle of

Oct 6th
Harbour came to both anchors again.

Wind backed to S.W. with clear
weather. The spray from the surf
outside of harbour over the break-
in 200 feet high. Both first
went up fore top gallant mast
& set up rigging. When shore
deserted.

Oct 7th
Shine pleasant weather.
at 2 P.M. the anchor & stood
out the North passage at dark
Lans End losing sight of 10
miles.
