Remarks On board of the ship Maryflower of N.Y.  
This 24 hours Begins with strong winds from the S  
And we stand about S.E. S. and is heavy. Sea is  
the middle part of the 24 hours heavy. Quits for  
The north and Sun dain the latter part So far  
that we was obliged to reef the main topsail  
and at 6 am or half past it bated little so  
we shook the reef out again And at 7 am  
a very heavy squall struck us behind mizen and  
battered spouts we were running before the Sun  
and sea she star so hard that she bore me  
The wheel the latter part it bated little So ends  
this 24 hours Latitude By observation 27.16

This 24 hours Begins with strong wind from the W.  
And we stand about S.E. S. and at 6 am it a  
Reef in the fore and 2 in the main topsail and  
in the mizen topsail the middle part of the  
very heavy squalls and showers of rain and light  
and thunder and the latter part it bated  
Hard and we scudging before the gale the ship for  
to the trough of the sea and our Captain took  
the ship was waterlogged her we called  
and chise up the fore and mizen topsails  
would then and reef the main and furl the fore  
sail and brought the ship too sound the bunn  
and the Captain said there was 3 feet water in  
hole we hoisted both pumps on and went down  
in the hold room and bled it out but we were  
mistaken there was but 1 foot in the hole So ends  
24 hours Latitude By dead reckoning 26.17

this 24 hours Begins with strong wind from the S  
and we tugging too we stole the after pole and we  
the Cherry Run topped by the Cooper the Wind  
So hard that we sent down the main top gallant  
and fished the crew of the main top sail tower  
sewed another block in and bore the sheet at  
and banded it home and it bore the rolling table  
fall to the S. E. and it tugged the wind on

and it blew very hard all the middle part and  
sharp flashes of lightning and down rain and at  
about 4 am on the part we closed the fore sail and fore top  
sail and mizen topsail and kept her of then then we  
hauld down the mizen topsail and not the mizen topsail the  
mizen staysel and about 5 minutes we took a heavy squall  
of rain the wind continued too blow from the S West  
and about 11 am we shook out 1 reef out of the fore  
and main topsail So ends this 24 hours Latitude 24.48

This 24 hours Begins with strong wind from the S West  
And we gear down the fore topsails and fore sail  
All hands Employed in ships duty And at 1 o'clock we blew  
up the fore and main topsails and reef then And at  
1/2 past 7 we took a very heavy squall the middle part  
bitly moderate and at 12 am we reefed the fore and mizen  
sail and at 7 am we lost them again And went out over  
S.W. and at 11 am we sent down the main top gallant  
So ends this 24 hours By Observation 22.42 Longitude

The S.W. and at 8 am we dove the fore stunsel rigging  
set them and set main top gallant stunsails and sent  
up the main rumbust So ends this 24 hours Latitude By  
Observation 21.9

this 24 hours Begins with light winds from the S West  
and at 1 o'clock we sent up the main Royal yard All hands  
Employed in washing and bedding And mending of the  
middle part of this 24 hours light wind from the S.W.  
All hands Employed in ships duty So ends this 24  
hours Latitude By observation 29.38

This 24 hours Begins with light winds from the West by both  
All hands Employed in ships duty. About 2 o'clock we sent  
Ship ahead standing to the S.W. with stunsails set  
And not knowing what ship it was the middle part  
light winds the latter part light winds All hands Em  
ployed in fitting the rigging and fitting the Boats  
So ends this 24 hours Latitude By observation 28.44

This 24 hours Begins with light winds from the S. E. S. W.  
And our course is South by West half west And at fair  
Sailing about 1 o'clock we took out the fore hole and got up  
a hark of corn and broke up the run and got up tea and  
brint oil and wine and barish and about 4 o'clock we  
fired again at 5 o'clock we Employed in ships duty the latter  
light winds in the S.W. and about 2 o'clock we took in the  
stunsails the S. part light winds So ends this 24  
hours Latitude By observation 27.30
