springs hid at 6 Am we took in the topmast stunsail
And braced the yards the wind about WSW and we
Sailed one watch below and the rest employed About 8
Pee spoke the Charles of 160 4 months out with 60
The cap came on board and staid till 12
Tone topsail So ends this 24 hours Latitude

This 24 hours begins with strong winds from
W. took in sail and at 4 Pm the ship was
Went out of sight saw 2 large right whales at 7
Tide too catch sun fish Best could not make
out and about 11 the wind breezed and we had
sail and set the stunsails the latter part the
Rattle sent down the m royal mast So ends this
24 hours Latitude 45-24

Saturday
the 28 Day
1827

This 24 hours begins with light winds from
W. we steared S. S. of one watch below and
rest employed about 8 Pm the wind breezed and
Pee took in the stunsail and topgansail and
Hauled up the mainmast the middle last masted
The latter the wind hauled to the S and at 4
Jack and steared by the wind sent down the
fore topgansail So ends this 24 hours Latitude

Sunday
the 29 Day
1827

This 24 hours begins with light wind from the
South one W below and the rest employed sent
the fore topgansail and tooked ship and sent
down the fore staryard and set the stunsail and at
1/2 past 4 hauled in the stunsail and rounded 88 fms
So the sail and steared our bows the middle last
The latter last strong wind about 5 am lost track
one water below So ends this 24 hours Latitude 48-56

Monday
the 30 Day
1827

This 24 hours strong wind from the NW and we
T too the wind and a heavy swell going line

1827

this 24 hours commences with strong wind
from the NW. took in the topmast stunsail
at 12 Pm the wind about WSW and we
back on the topgallant sail and kept the
topsail standing to the S. last part of the
last much the same. latter part much the same
New summer to the fore topsail. latter part
much the same. So ends Latitude 49-56

1827

this 24 hours commences with strong wind
from the NW. at 4 Pm saw 2 small
of sperm whales of the weather
parties on the water and saw 3 or 4
small whales and the part took in the
fore & middle topsail. latter part much
the same. So ends this 24 hours
Latitude 50-56

1828

this 24 hours commences with the
winds from the NW. came S by E
lower the fore and mizzen topsail were
ship and stood to the west by south with
part wind hauled to the North shook out
the Reels out of the topsails set the fore
and middle topsails and topgallant. Steered
thru the North West 1/2 West and front 15 am the
wind hauled back in the stunsail and kept it
long wind and sun came behind the 24 hours
So ends
