

The 15<sup>th</sup>  
Day 1827

On the 15<sup>th</sup> fine weather Wind East and Day light  
All hands Employed in Ships Duty At 4 am Went  
Too Rattling Down the fore rigging by 6 pm  
Finnish 2 men Afloat All day saw nothing  
At 6 pm became squally and fine breeze to  
The N. W. Sours 6.30 To ends the transactions  
of the Day Longitude by Dead reckoning 166° 40' - 33

The 16<sup>th</sup>  
Day 1827

On the 16<sup>th</sup> fine weather All hands employed in  
Ship's Duty 2 men Afloat saw about 2  
Gumpers At 11 am the Capt. got a distance  
With a kamometer Longitude 164° 40' 77  
At 7 pm found the Longitude by Dead reck  
ning 164° 12' 77. Wind about West Sours  
8 1/2 knots that is at 6 1/2 knots Sours 1 point  
variation to the right Latitude by Stars 30

The 17<sup>th</sup>  
Day of the 8

On the morning of the 17<sup>th</sup> fine weather Wind  
About S.W. and a fine breeze saw a long boat  
Off the lee beam 5 mile off saw it 5 times and  
saw it no more All hands Employed in Ship's  
Duty At 7 am met the boat of fine weather all  
day All bark breezed little and land further  
To the south Latitude this noon 32° 21' <sup>at 11</sup> <sub>longitud</sub>  
162° 15' <sup>at 11</sup> <sub>at 11</sub>

The 18<sup>th</sup>  
Day of the 0

On the 18<sup>th</sup> fine weather but strong wind from  
the land very soft saw a ship off the W. side  
Ten at 10 am spoke for it was the *Rovilla* of  
Norwich at *Ardesland* Cap. Brown 14 throats  
but 1900 lb he came on board with the Capt.  
and got dinner and supper with the Capt.  
and then went on board his *Argo* at 8  
pm fine weather

The 19<sup>th</sup>  
Day 1827

On the 19<sup>th</sup> Saturday fine weather Wind about  
S.W. and strong All hands Employed in Ship's Duty  
the other ship about 4 miles off the W. quarter  
seen in light all day At 5 pm the wind better  
little and the sea fell and became almost calm  
To ends the transactions Off the S. Latitude by 62° 12'  
at

The 20<sup>th</sup>  
Day 1827

On the 20<sup>th</sup> fine weather Wind about S.W. and  
about very strong We saw the other ship  
off the weather quarter standing to the west  
At 10 am we tacked and stood to the land  
East nothing doing this day Sunday 2 and 3<sup>rd</sup>  
Afloat nothing going see but gumpers and porpoises  
To ends this day Longitude 156° 30' Latitude 30

The 21<sup>st</sup>  
Day 1827  
of September

This 21<sup>st</sup> fine weather light wind from  
the North All hands Employed in Ship's Duty  
At 10 am got W. topsail and mended  
that by 3 pm and then got W. Tabbies  
and told the people and took 4 1/2 <sup>at 11</sup> <sub>at 11</sub> Cents

The 22<sup>nd</sup> Day  
of September

On the 22<sup>nd</sup> Day fine weather and a stark  
breeze All hands Employed in Ship's Duty and  
our father has finished ballin At 4 pm we  
led the Government and found it very little  
At 7 pm became cloudy and a little breeze  
Latitude by Observation 31° 7' South Longitude 153° 45'

The 23<sup>rd</sup> Day  
of September

On the 23<sup>rd</sup> fine weather All hands Employed  
in Ship's Duty At 10 am got the main  
stayed one bent and began to mend  
that at 4 finished that calm all day  
At 7 pm a light breeze sprang up  
from the ship and we were close to  
"On the landward took to ends this day 30
