Remarks on board Monday June 14th 1847

These 24 hours Commences with strong wind and cloudy weather heading to the Westward under short sail. Middle and latter part light breeze and pleasant from the S. heading to the W at 6 o'clock made all sail employed in ships duty saw nothing So Ends

Lat by Obs 30° 14' N Long 172° 31' W

Remarks on board Tuesday June 15th 1847

These 24 hours Commences with light breeze from the S and pleasant weather heading to the Westward Middle part light breeze and variable working to the Westward under all sail. Latter part light breeze from the S and thick weather at half past 10 o'clock saw sperm whales going quick to the Northward Lorned the boats and chased with out success So Ends

Lat 30° 15' N Long 171° 40' East

Remarks on board Wednesday June 16th 1847

These 24 hours Commences with light breeze and variables and pleasant weather heading to the Eastward at 2 o'clock the boats came on board with out success at 5 o'clock Lorned the boats again for the same whales, at 6 o'clock boats came on board with out success whales going quick to the Northward Latter Middle part light breeze from the NE and cloudy weather heading to N under short sail. Latter part light breeze and pleasant heading to the S under all sail, - rose light Tacks and braces, at half past 10 o'clock saw sperm whales going quick to the Northward Lorned the boats and chased but with out success so ends in chasing whales

Remarks on board Thursday June 17th 1847

These 24 hours Commences with calm and pleasant weather at 3 o'clock boats came on board with out success after a long chase at 4 o'clock light breeze from the S and pleasant heading to the Westward at sun set shortened sail. Middle and latter part fresh breeze from the S and pleasant weather heading over different Tacks under short sail boats employed in ships duty So Ends

Lat by Obs 30° 08' N Long 170° 53' East

Remarks on board Friday June 18th 1847

These 24 hours Commences with fresh breeze from the S and pleasant weather heading to the Eastward under short sail. Middle and latter part strong from the S and pleasant at 1 o'clock more ship heading WNW under short sail saw Nothing second these 24 hours

Lat by Obs 30° 13' N Long

Remarks on board Saturday June 19th 1847

These 24 hours Commences with strong wind from the S and pleasant weather heading to the Westward under short sail. Charles Tallman Boatstewer being unable to perform the Duty of Boatstewer in consequence of a Broken Arm Broken on a former voyage, John Mansie will take this place and perform the Duty of Boatstewer and have the Lay according and Charles Tallman will have an Ordinary Seaman's Lay while on Board He being unable to perform any other Duty Middle part squally from the S Latter part more Moderate made all sail heading WNW saw nothing So Ends these 24 hours
